Foreword by Association President - Lt Gen Richard Nugee CVO CB



It is difficult to know where to start with so much going on at the moment at national, local, Army and Defence levels but as I sit typing this, the areas of central London that have had Extinction Rebellion colourful tent 'villages' on cross roads, major

streets and Trafalgar Square until recently, are being cleared by the Police, to allow a little more normality to the working and living environment. No more will my meetings be against a backdrop of drums and loud hailers proclaiming for the climate, or on my cycle home will I have to thread my way through tents and banners across the whole road. It may be easier, but a little less colourful!

Much has been going on in my space (personnel) as well this year. Flexible Service has been introduced, so that Service Personnel can 'dial down' their commitment and yet stay in the Regular forces, either by working a shorter week or by opting not to deploy for a period of time. The Future Accommodation Model has been introduced in Faslane, HM Navel Base Clyde, where it has been seen as very popular as it offers much more choice to individuals as to how to live their lives. Instead of just being offered a Quarter or SLA, there is choice available to live in subsidised accommodation where you want to live. And we have also started to allow couples who are not married but who can prove a long term relationship to live together in surplus Quarters. Hundreds of couples have already taken up the opportunity since the policy went live in April.

We are in the process of helping set up the Office for Veterans Affairs in the Cabinet Office who will take forward the numerous good ideas that came out of the Veterans Strategy and Consultation, that took place at the beginning of the year. Part of the OVA's remit, apart from ensuring closer and stronger coordination across Government, is to act as a focal point for Veteran Forums (we are setting a Veterans Council) we can hear directly from veterans of their concerns. We will also be using the Veterans Gateway more, to ensure that all veterans know where to go for information an if they have a concern. Hopefully we will be creating an app to put on every veteran's phone. And shortly we will be announcing how veterans can apply for a veterans card

- those leaving the Services already get one but we need to open it up to those who have already left.

And at Defence level, Joint Force Command will shortly be renamed Strategic Command and will become responsible for Space and Cyber, both growing areas for the future as we understand how to harness the digital age across Defence. This is an area where we need to be right at the front of technology and development - an exciting prospect for some (I am not sure I can claim to understand it all!)

At a national level, now that the General Elections is over, you will be as aware as I about what might happen on Brexit and the trade talks to come - interesting times as they say, and certainly a great deal of unknown futures in store! In the Army we ought to be more resilient than most I think, as we are so used to the uncertainty of battle, and of the requirement to plan knowing that 'the enemy has a vote' and so the outcome will not look like the plan at all. And we are not bad at contingency planning as a result. Perhaps we could teach others a thing or two, not least to 'stay calm'!

But there is one certainty; the next Dinner will be on 13 Jun 20 at Larkhll, and after failing to attend last year (for which may apologies) I have every intention of attending, and have already changed my plans to be there. I hope to see you there!

Standard Bearer's Report by Andrew Jones (former Sgt (AC))

As the Royal Artillery Clerks Association Standard Bearer, I attended the Royal Artillery Association D-Day service and Act of Remembrance at Wooburn Green near High Wycombe War Memorial on Sunday 9 June 2019 at 1200hrs.

A memorial service was held in the village to mark the 75th anniversary of the D-Day Normandy landings

More than 100 people paid their respects to those who fell in the 1944 Allied invasion of Northern France to free the area from Nazi control.

Veterans, families and young children met at the memorial ground on Sunday 9 June 2019 at 1200hrs laying wreaths, singing hymns and reflecting on the historic day in World War Two.

Village vicar Mr Martin Wallington was there to make a speech, as were the parish council, as information was read out on the details of the day and of those from the village who gave their lives for their country.

The Last POst and national anthem were played, while a two minute silence was also observed.

The service was put on by the High Wycombe branch of the Royal Artillery Association and member Mr George O'Leary was pleased with the outcome.

He said: 'It went very well indeed. I dare say there was probably about 10 people there in all'.

'There were youngsters, mothers and fathers, grandparents bringing their children and grandchildren - it was very good'.

'It was a team effort all the way round.'









Welfare Secretary's Report by Dennis Norris (former WO2 (QMS(AC))



I am pleased to report that at present there are no outstanding welfare cases ongoing within the association. As always, if you know of an association member who would benefit support from the association, please make contact with myself or any of the association committee. Any support given will be dealt

with sensitively and in confidence.

Some of you will probably know that I work for Greater Manchester Police and for the past year I have been involved in an initiative that GMP has been supporting called **Project Nova** which supports ex-armed forces personnel who have been arrested or are at risk of arrest.

It has been recognised that our armed forces personnel come from a very regimented environment and a minority find it hard to transition back into civilian life. These veterans are more at risk of a downward spiral and can lead to drinking, anti-social behavior, other criminal conduct and become involved in domestic abuse.

Project Nova is operated by staff with a blend of experience from the armed forces, Criminal Justice System and charities. The staff are skilled at engaging with veterans and understand their experience of military service, and their transition back to civilian life.

Project Nova undertakes a needs assessment for each individual and puts in place specialist support from a network of military charities and other organisations. They then keep in touch ensuring that the veteran has that support and an on-going point of contact to help prevent any further offending and intervening early if they do.

As a police force GMP come into contact with members of the community who would benefit from this charity and GMP signed the **Armed Forces Covenant** in 2015 which is a pledge by an organisation, whether public or private, to treat our armed forces personnel, past and present, their families and the cadet forces, fairly. It is run by the Ministry of Defence and supported by the Home Office.

As part of this there is also the **Defence Employer Recognition Scheme (ERS)** which encourages

employers to support Veterans and inspire others to do the same. The scheme encompasses bronze, silver and gold awards for employer organisations that pledge, demonstrate or advocate support to veterans and the armed forces community.

GMP currently holds the silver award but is aiming to be a gold award holder by 2020, an accolade held by only one other force nationally.

GMP recognise the skills of veterans and are actively recruiting ex Armed Forces personnel to be Police Officers, Support Officers Call Handlers and Radio Operators and numerous other Police Staff roles. It's easy to refer some, simply email <code>info.nst@projectnova.org.uk</code> or call 0800 917 7299. This could be for someone under arrest or someone you see struggling in the community.

ARMY BENEVILENT FUND (ABF) The Soldiers Charity

We are The Soldiers' Charity. We give lifetime support to serving and retired soldiers and their families. They risk so much for us, but for them, it's just doing their job. In return, we provide financial assistance when they are in real need. That's what we've been here to offer for 70 years.

The grants we give break down into seven broad areas. You can read about each of these here.

Annuities: to help supplement the incomes of older veterans or their widows living alone on basic pensions.

Care home fees: modest top-up grants to help with the cost for older veterans or their widows, where local authority grants are insufficient.

Bursaries: to help with education and training and include: Funding for training colleges that help retrain soldiers with disabilities and training course fees and essential equipment for individual soldiers Support for ex-soldiers taking higher education courses to start on new careers after leaving the Army. Help with funding for continuing education for the children of soldiers who have died or been severely disabled in service.

Holiday schemes: for families under stress. Each year, more than 200 families benefit from short breaks at Pontins and Warner holiday resorts. An annual grant to the Guild of St Helena allows service children with special needs to have a holiday.

Special Funds: We administer special funds to assist soldiers who have been injured while on active service in Northern Ireland, The Falklands Campaign or The Gulf War. Dependants of those killed in these campaigns may also qualify for help from the funds. The George Purse Trust provides grants to those who live in South Wales and are in need of respite care.

General Needs: Grants can be made for a wide variety of purposes, as long as there is a clear need which cannot be met from other sources e.g. statutory grants and benefits, local funds etc. One in five of these grants are made towards mobility aids e.g. wheelchairs, stair-lifts, special beds etc.

Current Operations Fund: Launched in 2007 by the ABF the Current Operations Fund supports soldiers injured or families of those killed as a result of their Service during the current operations in Iraq and Afghanistan. The Fund was set up as a direct response to the mounting numbers of serving soldiers and their families in great need who require immediate help. The grants cover everything from retraining a disabled soldier for a new career to providing holiday funds for a war widow and her children.



Unfortunately, due to circumstances beyond my control I was unable to attend the 85th Annual Reunion and Association Dinner at Larkhill; I was away on a family holiday in Spain and only arrived back in the UK on Sat 8th June but trust that everyone who attended had a splendid time. I hope you have all been keeping up with the association and events via the web page and the Facebook page and you have received the latest edition of Crossed Quills.

It is a pleasure to be a member of the association and I have been most grateful in receiving correspondence from brother artillery clerks who are members but for various reasons are unable to attend the annual Reunion and Dinner in the Mess at Larkhill. I have become something of a Biannual attendee at the reunion with my participation in Dragon Boat events, holidays/ wedding etc. but do hope to be in attendance at the 20th Anniversary event in June 2020.

We live in a frantic world and busy times and it is sometimes difficult to make time for everything and so I must take the opportunity to thank Joe Falzon, Andy Tibble, and Roy Deal for all their efforts on behalf of the association and it would be remiss not to mention the sterling effort Leon Lyell and all the work he has done on the Crossed Quills page on Facebook and the Artillery Clerk's web page, sterling efforts, well done and thank you.

Part of my role as the regional representative for the North of England is to act as a conduit for the Association Committee and if any Association Member is in need of any kind of assistance or is aware of any of our members in the North who require help, support or assistance then please do not hesitate to contact me. On the note of help and welfare, this has at times been quite a challenging 12 months for me; I had been under a fair degree of work related stress the added pressure over the reduction in salary and the uncertainty of redundancy was obviously having a negative effect on my health and wellness.

I had been feeling rather low for some time but had been reluctant to visit my GP, then just before Christmas I realised that I needed some help and accepted the advice of the doctor in relation to medical assistance. At the same time I was signed off work with depression and I contacted the Help for Heroes Recovery Centre at Phoenix House in Catterick who were absolutely brilliant. I'm sure many will recognise that it's only when you start to feel better that you actually realise how poorly you had been.

I had received emails from Help for Heroes for some time as they had helped fund the trip to the International Dragon Boat Festival in Hong Kong in 2017, I identified that the recovery centres through the country run a variety of courses to assist and support serving and former members of HM Forces. I had a psychological evaluation and it was agreed that they could provide me with cognitive behavioural therapy and one to one counselling. I attended a 3 day Health and Wellbeing Course at Phoenix House which was absolutely brilliant, a mixture of class room work, physical activity, and therapy including yoga and cookery classes! The centre is absolutely outstanding

and being back in a military environment was quite cathartic. After just three days I felt much better, having completed 10 weeks of one to one counselling and more importantly I am feeling happier and more positive than I have been in a very long.

I am currently involved with a pilot project at Phoenix House which involves one to one session of compassionate mind therapy. So all in all this is helping me immensely, it's very true the sayings "it's good to talk" and "not all injuries are visible" because I don't think I could have got to where I am today without seeking out help and assistance.

I do my best to try and keep myself as reasonably fit and healthy as I can and still paddle and dragon boat race I am also attending regular Yoga classes at Phoenix House which has helped immensely to help me relax and cope with life's stresses.

I travelled to Cardiff on 9th March for a Rugby Club reunion with a difference, whilst serving as Chief Clerk JSPRS in Hong Kong I played rugby with the Tigers Rugby Football Club and have many fond memories from my time in the Far East. There was about 12 former players and a number of wives and partners in attendance some who hadn't seen one another for over 28 years but it was like most military get together and it was like only yesterday and in no time the beers were flowing along with the stories. As we were in Cardiff and the 6 Nations was on it wasn't long before we were all in fine voice and cheering on our respective nations in the rugby.

On the 14th July I joined some former members of 7th Parachute Regiment RHA in Newcastle along with a large number of other Veterans from all services and a wide variety of Units/Corps and cap badges including a sizeable contingent of other Gunners, who were all coming together under the umbrella Million Veterans March protesting against the prosecution of Northern Ireland Veterans. The event was very well organised and marshalled and included a large contingent of motor bikes known as Rolling Thunder, having formed up and accompanied by pipes and drums we marched a short distance to the BBC headquarters were we held a small protest outside the premises before moving across the road and a number of speeches were made. After the speeches concluded we formed up again and marched into the centre of Newcastle be preceded by the rolling thunder of the veterans on motor bikes it was quite an impressive sight and the general public showed their support throughout the march. After a small wreath laying ceremony at the cenotaph the group marched to the Early Grey Memorial, where further speeches were made. As is tradition in the

military the day continued in a local hostelry where the beer and banter flowed in equal amounts.

Pay and Promotion of Clerks, Royal Artillery

EDWARD R.I.

A.O.54 WHEREAS We deem it expedient to amend the regulations relating

April to the pay and promotion of soldiers employed as clerks in Our Royal Artillery;

OUR WILL AND PLEASURE is that all soldiers who may hereafter be permanently employed as clerks in Our Royal Artillery shall form a section to be called the Artillery Clerks' Section, and shall, from the 1st April 1903, be paid and promoted as follows:

No increase of rank or pay under this article shall be allowed, unless specially recommended by the officer under whom the non-commissioned officer is serving.

Given at Our Court at St. James's this 21st day of March, 1903, in the 3rd year of Our Reign.

Artillery Clerks' Association Charter

General

- 1. The Association, entitled the "Artillery Clerks' Association" was formed at Woolwich on Saturday 7th March 1998. This Charter is being adopted to guide its activities. The Charter may be changed at any time by the Committee to reflect the wishes of the Association members.
- 2. The Aim and Object of the Artillery Clerks' Association is to promote comradeship amongst its members, both serving and retired and to provide a focal point for all members of the Association. The Association is essentially an old comrades association of former Artillery Clerks, either serving or retired.
- 3. The Artillery Clerks' Association is affiliated to and is a Branch of the Royal Artillery Association (RAA). All members of the Royal Artillery Association will be granted life membership of the RAA on acceptance.

Eligibility

- 4. **Full Members**. Full membership of the Association is open to any former Artillery Clerk in the rank range from Sergeant to Warrant Officer Class 1, either serving or retired. Membership may also be granted, with the recommendation of a former Artillery Clerk or member of the Association, to clerks who served in the Royal Artillery in the rank range from Gunner to Bombardier, and have subsequently been promoted to Sergeant in the Adjutant General's Corps.
- 5. **Honorary Membership**. Honorary Membership of the Association is specially designed to cover the widows and relatives of deceased Artillery Clerks. Other special cases of honorary membership will be considered on merit by the Committee and voted upon by the Committee and voted upon by the members at the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Honorary members may not vote on matters voted upon at the AGM.
- 6. **Authorization**. Membership of the Association may be sought by anyone under these rules. In the event of there being some doubt regarding application, the Artillery Clerks' Association Committee will arbitrate. The Association Committee has the right to refuse any application for membership, or cancel any existing membership, for example, for disciplinary reasons.

Purpose

- 7. The specific purpose of the Association is to provide:
 - a. A focal point for comradeship, largely through periodic reunion of:
 - (1) A formal Annual Reunion Dinner.
 - (2) An informal Dinner to be held at a frequency and location to be decided by the Committee, to include wives, girlfriends and widows.
 - (3) A very limited welfare service. This essentially means that the Artillery Clerks' Association, in promoting contacts between members, provides a network through which help can be given to any member. The focus for this activity within the Association is the Secretary.

Organisation

- 8. The affairs of the Artillery Clerks' Association will be overseen by the Artillery Clerks' Association Committee. The Committee will meet at intervals decided upon by the Chairman, and will comprise of:
 - a. President (Honorary).
 - b. Chairman.

- c. Secretary. Responsibilities cover:
 - (1) Association Membership.
 - (2) Correspondence.
 - (3) Providing a focus for the Association's welfare work and links to the RAA.
 - (4) Production of a periodic newsletter.
 - (5) Coordinating the activities of the Area Representatives.
- d. Treasurer. Responsibilities cover:
 - (1) Maintenance of a bank account entitled the "Artillery Clerks' Association".
 - (2) Accounting for all the finances of the Artillery Clerks' Association.
 - (3) Presenting a Statement of Account to the Committee (as and when required) and annually at the AGM
- e. Regional Representatives. Responsibilities cover:
 - (1) The recruitment of new members.
 - (2) Maintaining an area membership list.
 - (3) Coordinating travel to Reunions and other Association activities.

Areas covered are:

- (1) Northern Ireland.
- (2) Scotland.
- (3) Wales.
- (4) The North West consisting of Cumbria, Lancashire, Merseyside, Greater Manchester and Cheshire.
- (5) The North consisting of Northumberland, Tyne and Wear, Durham, Cleveland, North, West and South Yorkshire and Humberside.
- (6) The Midlands consisting of Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Lincolnshire, Shropshire, Staffordshire, West Midlands, Leicestershire, Hereford and Worcestershire and Warwickshire.
- (7) The East consisting of Buckinghamshire, Bedfordshire, Essex, Northamptonshire, Hertfordshire, Cambridgeshire, Norfolk and Suffolk.
- (8) London Area
- (9) The South consisting of Oxfordshire, Berkshire, Hampshire, Isle of Wight, Surrey, West Sussex, East Sussex and Kent.
- (10) The West consisting of Cornwall, Devon, Somerset, Dorset, Gloucestershire, Avon and Wiltshire.
- (11) Germany.
- (12) The Rest of the World.
- 9. Additional members of the Committee may be appointed by the Chairman as required, for example, Reunion Secretary and Assistant Secretary.

Fees

- 10. Membership fees are to be determined by the Committee. There is to be a fee to join the Association and the annual renewal fee.
- 11. Fees are to cover the costs of administration, including telephone calls, postage and stationery.
- 12. Reunions are to be self-financing, that is, those attending are to meet the full cost of all activities of the Reunion.

Approval of the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on Saturday 9th June 2018

Matters Arising from the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on Saturday 9th June 2018

- **Shop**. Stock held is £300.00. 15 ties at £20 each.

Treasurer's Updates. All members are reminded of their subscriptions within the Crossed Quills, the Web Page and at the AGM. They are also invited to join the mandate system and gift aid upon joining the association.

2018 INCOME AND EXPENDITURE REPORT (As at 31 Dec 18 submitted to the RAA)

I have a copy of the report which was submitted to the RAA, signed by the Chairman and Secretary. I will go in to more detail if required but the end state was:

- Insurance. The insurance for the fund is valid until 31 Mar 20. It is with the firm Towergate Wilsons. The cost this year was £331:80. This includes personal accident cover for the Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Reunion Secretary, Standard Bearer and Regional Secretaries.
- **Shop**. Shop stock consists of 15 ties @ £20:00, therefore totaling £300.00. There are no cuff links and lapel pins remaining.
- **RAA Draw Tickets**. Annually we support the RAA Draw by purchasing tickets.
- **Conclusion**. Members are requested to change

their Standing Orders to £15. Treasurer chasing outstanding subscriptions and those who have been paying £5 from 2013 and now the change to £15.

Steve Beards proposed and Marty Hester seconded that the `Treasurer's Report is accepted. This proposal was put to the vote and CARRIED unanimously.

Welfare Secretary's Report.

The Welfare Secretary, Mr Dennis Norris informed those present that all welfare cases ongoing are currently at a satisfactory state with individuals receiving the appropriate support of the Association.

I am pleased to report that at present there are no outstanding welfare cases ongoing within the association. As always, if you know of an association member who would benefit support from the association, please make contact with myself or any of the association committee. Any support given will be dealt with sensitively and in confidence.

Some of you will probably know that I work for Greater Manchester Police and for the past year, I have been involved in an initiative that GMP has been supporting called **Project Nova**_which supports ex-armed forces personnel who have been arrested or are at risk of arrest.

It has been recognised that our armed forces personnel come from a very regimented environment and a minority find it hard to transition back into civilian life. These veterans are more at risk of a downward spiral and can lead to drinking, anti-social behavior, other criminal conduct and become involved in domestic abuse.

Project Nova is operated by staff with a blend of experience from the armed forces, Criminal Justice System and charities. The staff are skilled at engaging with veterans and understand their experience of military service, and their transition back to civilian life.

Project Nova undertakes a needs assessment for each individual and puts in place specialist support from a network of military charities and other organisations. They then keep in touch ensuring that the veteran has that support and an on-going point of contact to help prevent any further offending and intervening early if they do.

As a police force GMP come into contact with members of the community who would benefit from this charity and GMP signed the **Armed Forces Covenant** in 2015 which is a pledge by an organisation, whether public or

private, to treat our armed forces personnel, past and present, their families and the cadet forces, fairly. It is run by the Ministry of Defence and supported by the Home Office.

As part of this there is also the **Defence Employer Recognition Scheme (ERS)** which encourages employers to support Veterans and inspire others to do the same. The scheme encompasses bronze, silver and gold awards for employer organisations that pledge, demonstrate or advocate support to veterans and the armed forces community.

GMP currently holds the silver award but is aiming to be a gold award holder by 2020, an accolade held by only one other force nationally.

GMP recognise the skills of veterans and are actively recruiting ex Armed Forces personnel to be Police Officers, Support Officers Call Handlers and Radio Operators and numerous other Police Staff roles.

Historical Secretary's Report

The Historical, Mr Stephen Read made the following comments:

I would like to echo the Chairman. My thanks go to Terry Cooper for the great work that he has done searching Facebook and the wider internet, for details of living and deceased Artillery Clerks. The span of what he has found is wide, covering individuals that served prior to WW1 right the way through to those who served with us in more recent times but who are not Association members. I found of special interest of especial interest the WW2 era Army list that details some 131 WO1 (SM(AC)s. It was a surprise to find some familiar names listed such as Norris, Tasker, Holmes, Vernon, Tyler, Higgins & Taylor. Coincidence or relations of Association members?

In addition to members and historical references Terry, and others, have also posted some interesting photos on Facebook that I have been able to download and copy into Word documents for temporary storage. If other members have photographs, that might be of interest to the Association, please let me know, as it would be good to be able to take copies of them for our historical archive.

With the wealth of information that has been unearthed over the past year it is a challenge to know how best to make it available to the wider membership. With the support of Leo Lyall I am considering how the History pages of the website can be organized and laid out to make the information readily available. I am minded to break the section down into World War 1 and before, Interwar Years, World War 2 (1946 to 1960) then by decades thereafter. Member's thoughts on this would be much appreciated.

Germany Secretary's Report.

The German Secretary, Mr Ron Holmes MSM informed those present that he was not intending to organize a reunion in Germany 2019 due to closures. He did go onto say that if anyone wanted to come over in October/November 2019 (date to be confirmed), he would arrange for a dinner to take place in a local restaurant. Individuals, however, would be responsible for arranging their own transport and accommodation. Further details will follow in due course.

Webmaster's Report

In the absence of The Webmaster, Mr Leo Lyall, Andy Tibble passed to those present the following comments:

The Association website hosting package was renewed for another year earlier this year at a cost of £71.86.

The website has not changed much since the 2018 Reunion as there has been only a small amount of information provided from the membership. Changes made to the site have been items such as notices on the Home page, membership changes (leavers/additions), and reunion updates.

As continually stressed, the website will be at a standstill without input and as there has been little or no input, there has been little or no update.

One major drive since the last report has been the formulation and publishing of the AC Newsletter. This inaugural newsletter was published in December 2018 with the second following in April this year. The next newsletter is expected to be published in August.

The idea behind the newsletter is to reach out to the membership via their email to promote the AC website as a hub of information for Association matters and keep members updated on items such as the reunion weekend. There are 128 people subscribed to the newsletter from our membership of 206 members. On the two occasions we have published approximately, 80% clicked-on and opened it. Feedback from the initiative has been welcoming to the idea.

All of those members present raised a vote of thanks to Leo Lyall for all of his hard work.

The Reunion Secretary, Roy Deal, gave a comprehensive briefing on the format of the Reunion Dinner and the evening. Roy went onto inform those present that Hauke had very kindly requested to cover the costs of the Port for this evening dinner.

Future Format of Association Reunion Dinners. This discussion was prompted to a degree by the

decline, year on year, of members attending the Reunion Weekends at Larkhill (averaging no more than 33 in recent years), and the desire to improve attendance

The second stage of this consultation was to reach out to the wider membership not present at the AGM and to tease out more evidenced views in order to help the Committee determine the way ahead for the 2020 Reunion Weekend and beyond.

Members will be aware that over the past three years the Committee has looked into the viability of other alternative venues such as the Union Jack Club and the Victory Services Club in London and Gamecock Barracks in Bramcote, Nr Nuneaton. All three alternatives have been discounted due to the combined cost of a Banqueting Room (with bar) hire, accommodation, catering and, important for some, bar prices.

Larkhill is now the Royal Artillery Centre of Excellence where we are fortunate enough to enjoy the support of 34 Battery, the RARSM, the Regimental Secretary and the ability to retain our traditional regimental dinner format.

The Committee would like to hear your views and will be grateful if you can respond to the survey link below as soon as possible but no later than Sunday 30th June 2019.

(Secretary's Note: This was sent out to all members as part of the Association Newsletter).

It was proposed that the sum not to exceed £500.00 be transferred from GPF to defray the cost of this of the 2019 Reunion Dinner. (Secretary's Note: Please note that in June 2019 the Chairman authorised the transfer of £207.75 from the GPF to offset the 2019 Reunion Dinner costs).

Phil Headford proposed and Dave Cussell seconded this proposal. The proposal was put to the vote and was CARRIED unanimously.

Association Survey – Results and Conclusions

You will recall that the Association Committee instigated an e-survey following the discussion at the last AGM to seek out the views of our members on the future format, venue and date of our Annual Reunion weekend. The survey was sent out to 129 subscribers (63% of the membership). The survey results based on the 42 returns (33% take up) that were submitted are as follows:

2019 Reunion: All those who attended gave a rating of Excellent/Very Good.

Future Reunion Weekends should take place at Larkhill

24 (57%) Strongly Agree, with 7 (17%) Somewhat Agree

8 (19%) Neither Agree or Disagree, and 3 (7%) Somewhat Disagree

Strongly Disagree – 0 (0%)

Your preference from potential dates for the 2020 Reunion:

19 (45%) opted for 21/22 March 2020, with 23 (55%) preferring 13/14 June 2020

Would you be more interested in attending if accompanied with your partner:

7 (17%) voted for this change, with 12 (29%) against. 6 (14%) voted "No" 17 (40%) Neither Agree nor Disagree.

Additional Analysis:

Those who are regular supporters of the Reunion each year:

- 25 replied with 14 (56%) opting for the next reunion to be held on 13/14 June 2929, with 11 (44%) preferring 21/22 March 2020..
- The consensus is that the Annual Reunion should remain in the same format and venue, without wives attending. Members acknowledge that the current package we enjoy at Larkhill offers optimal value (money, quality, service, support) not available anywhere else.

Those that have not attended a recent Reunion:

• 17 returns were received from members who have not regularly supported the Reunion each year. 9

(53%) opted for next Reunion to be held on 13/14 June 2020, with 8 (7%) opting for 21/22 March 2020.

 Reasons given for non-attendance range from "I don't attend as wives should be allowed to come along", to "Location is not ideal", to "Ill health prevents me from travelling".

Conclusions. Considering the discussions at the AGM and the returns that have been provided (disappointing as they are), the Association Committee unanimously agree that:

- Membership of the Association has, for several years, remained at a similar level. Whilst attendance at the Annual Reunions has fallen, in comparison to the numbers 20 years ago, there now seems to be a core of 30 - 40 regular attendees who have supported the events in recent years.
- In common with other veteran and old comrade associations, over time membership of the Association and attendance at Reunions will dwindle.
- We would not attract more members to attend Reunions by moving away from Larkhill or by including our wives/partners.
- We currently have a great package in Larkhill which is not available anywhere else in the country.
- We benefit from the support of a resident Battery and the wider Artillery community in Larkhill.
- The Annual Reunion weekend and dinner should remain in its current format at the Larkhill Mess, for as long as there are enough numbers attending to justify it and the Association can afford it.
- And finally the next Reunion Weekend will be held in Larkhill, in its current format, on 13/14 June 2020








74 Independent Medium Battery (The Battle Axe Company) Royal Artillery by Mr Marty Hester (Former WO2)

The Korean War is now history but the recent move of 74 (The Battle Axe Company) to 47 Regt, the Regt where I finished my career with inspired me to look out this article written by a friend of mine and was published in the Gunner a few years ago.

I served in Korea with the Battery from April 1953 to April 1954. Luckily, there was a truce in July 1954. At this time, I was not a Clerk but a Driver/Operator used as FOP but on occasions had to work on the guns. The man who wrote all of this, George Welling is like me, nearly 85 and quite a few years ago, he wrote all of this in the Gunner and the British Legion and managed to recruit about 25 of us Battle Axe veterans and for years we attended reunions at whatever Regiment the Battery had at the time. Each Regiment would invite us to Battle Axe Day on 24th February each year, there would be a parade, and the veterans would be treated like Royalty. Sadly, this year there was no announcement in the Gunner of the Day nor did we get invites!

This Guy George whilst in Korea and crossing the frozen Imgin River fell through the ice and was rescued by helicopter and flown straight to hospital (American) in Japan where an American General visited and pined a Purple Heart on the bed of each patient. George tried to tell the doctor (a Colonel) that he was British but the doctor told him he could not return the medal to the General. Well that is the story!

74 Independent Medium Battery (The Battle Axe Company) Royal Artillery by George Welling

From comments in Morning Calm, and also Gunner Magazine, it is abundantly clear, that it is not commonly known, 74 Independent Medium Battery (The Battle Axe Company) 32 Medium Regiment Royal Artillery served in Korea.

After each publication, I always receive many irate phone calls from ex members of the Battery, with always

the same complaint, and I quote "does nobody know 74 Battery served in Korea?"

May I take this opportunity to explain to the less knowledgeable? (The Battle Axe Company) Royal Artillery landed in Korea in March 1953 with eight 5.5 Howitzers, the largest British Guns fired on the Korean Peninsula.

The Battery Commander was major A. J. Batten D.C.M RA with Troop Commanders, Captain Paddy Ryan now Brigadier Ryan with (A) Troop, and Captain Richard Trant (now General Sir Richard Trant KCB DSc) with (B) Troop.

Whilst in Korea the Battery provided general support for the whole of the Commonwealth Division also supporting The American 2nd Infantry Division, also The American 1st US Marine Division, plus The Turkish Brigade and 1st Republic of Korea Infantry Division.

Prior to the arrival of 74 Battery, the Commonwealth Division has relied upon the Corps Artillery of the US Corps, under whom it was serving.

This was a most important reinforcement, which enabled Brigadier Gregson's counter-battery staff to reach out to enemy Artillery positions, well beyond the reach of the 25 pounders of the field Artillery Regiments.

The Battery fired no less than 56,000 rounds in the period March to July 27th, a total weight of 2450 imperial tons of high explosives; I am not talking small shells, each 5.5 inch projectile weighed in at 96 pounds. In one twenty four hour period the Battery fired no less than one thousand four hundred and forty seven rounds, mainly at North Korea and Chinese gun positions and infantry who were desperate to take the Hook, the gateway to Seoul.

Under normal conditions a 5.5 Howitzer, weighing 6 tons had a 10 man gun crew, but as Korean Veterans well know conditions in Korea were hardly normal, our ten men crews had to split into two crews so that we were able to keep up the barrage day and night.

On several occasions, the breaches glowed red, and on more than one occasion, necessitating the barrel needing changing twice in 48 hours, caused by the heat of continuous firing.

Like it or not, the sleeping men had to be awoken to help in moving this 6 tons of solid steel, the spades alone weighing three hundred pounds each, and sometimes buried up to 18 inches in the ground, every man was needed, and at times five or six from other Guns. Often I am asked by Gunners of mortar Battery's and 25 pounders how we moved the 5.5 Howitzer, I can only reply with great difficulty!

98 Independent Battery, 32 Regiment Royal Artillery arrived in Hong Kong in April 1954 to take over from 74 Battery (The Battle Axe Company's) Guns. 74 Battery returned to 32 Regiment in Sek Kong in the New Territories, Hong Kong in May 1954.

The Regiment finally returned to England in April 1955, having served three years in the Far east.

74 Battery is still in existence, no longer a Medium Battery, now in the roll of a heavy Battery with MNLRS, and one Troop named "Hook Troop" in honour of the part 74 Battery played at the Battle of the Hook. My friends from the Battery still meet regularly, especially on Battle Axe Day the 24th February. The Day each year the Battery troop the Battle Axe won in the Martinique on 24th February 1809.
