# Foreword by Association President

Charles Dickens described the start of 'A Tale of 2 Cities' as It was the best of times, it was the worst of times. This year feels a bit like that. We have had the most amazing Platinum Jubilee for Her Majesty celebrating the extraordinary life of the one true constant in our lives, a pleasure that will not come around like that again, and then just months later, the end of the longest reign by a monarch this country has ever seen. 2022 may well become known as the year of Elizabeth The Great, as there have been calls for, but what no one can doubt was the pure majesty of Her funeral, with all its pomp and ceremony. The comments around the world in support of The Queen, and of the extraordinary and brilliant precision of all 3 Services in ensuring that she was buried with the attention to detail that she was renowned for, made one proud to be British. All those involved in the planning and execution of the Royal Funeral should take immense pride in having done their duty to the Commander in Chief in the style she deserved. We all owe them a debt of gratitude

But that is not all that has happened this year, of course, and as I write, the politics of the country is in a degree of turmoil, not seen for a while, with uncertain long and short term outcomes promised. From

record breaking weather this summer, topping 40°C for the first time in this country (walking around Aldershot that day, the heat reminded me of Basra or Helmand), to the first serious European war in my lifetime, and then a toppling of a Prime Minister and Leadership election, things are certainly interesting! Added to that, floods from torrential downpours, and most importantly, a cost of energy which is going to affect us all and then the cost of living crisis and inflation the likes of which we haven't seen since I remember my father working at home by Tilley Lamp in the 1970's during the 3 day working week (and 98% supertax!), and perhaps the future looks bleak.

Soldiers however, in my experience, are optimists who are always looking for opportunities and the bright side of things. So even as the Ukrainians suffer hugely on our behalf, fighting for their very existence as an independent country and keeping Putin's ambition in check, as Gunners we should be thankful that the role and power of Artillery, never forgotten by the Russians, is now being recognised more by the Army - our trade is in the ascendancy. I doubt we will get

back to the level of being 25% of the Army (and over 1 million Gunners) in WW2 but I suspect that we will finally see some investment in Air Defence, rocket systems and good old fashioned tube artillery. Would it be too bold to say «about time!»?

And next year we celebrate our own Silver Jubilee (or 25th Anniversary) as the Artillery Clerks Association. With the Master Gunner of St James's Park attending the unveiling of our commemorative silver centrepiece (thank you to all our donors!) the celebration in June will be something to look forward to and remember. Do see if you can make it to the Reunion Dinner on 24th June 2023. It will be fun! See you there!

I wish you all a very Happy Christmas and New Year, and I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at the Reunion in June and seeing our new silver centrepiece.

The Covid Pandemic is slowly but surely receding and with the ongoing vaccination programme well and truly underway we are getting back to some sort of normality.

We should remember that we did lose one member to the Pandemic (David Hamilton) and a number of members suffered from hospital admission to a version of “man flu” and I am sure there are some members still suffering the after effects known as ‘long Covid’.

The world is changing with the ongoing war in the Ukraine – General Granville-Chapman when MGRA and the Guest of Honour at our association dinner a few years ago stated during his speech that although the cold war was over, the main threat to NATO still came from Russia and he was correct.

The War in the Ukraine has had a global impact on fuel and food prices dragging millions into fuel and food poverty. “We put veterans and their families in touch with the organisations best placed to help with the information, advice and support they need – from healthcare and housing to employability, finances, personal relationships and more.”

The Veterans Gateway has links to some useful organisations that can offer help, advice and support for Veterans in financial hardship.

There is also support and help for veterans from the Government run website Veterans UK. Veterans UK is responsible for administering compensation and pensions schemes for both serving personnel, veterans and their families, as well as the Veterans Welfare and Defence Transition Services. However, did you know that Veterans UK is part of the Ministry of Defence’s shared services delivery organisation, Defence Business Services? As well as veterans services, in DBS they also look after Pay, HR, and lots more in-between for the Armed Forces Community. So, chances are that if you have served even one day in the UK Armed Forces, you will have used the services of DBS.

In Veterans UK they know that they can continuously improve how they provide their services and make your experience of Veterans UK and DBS a better one. They can’t do that without listening to the people that have or could use their services, and better understand what they can do to help you.

They have taken the results of the DBS Veterans Customer Satisfaction Survey and alongside those, invited many members of the armed forces and veterans communities, and their advocates, to ‘Lived Experience’ events, where senior leaders and staff from Veterans UK have listened to feedback and suggestions on what they need directly from veterans and supporting organisations.

They are committed to enhancing services where they can and playing their part to deliver on the Government’s Veterans’ Strategy Action Plan 2022/24 and have been working hard to address some of the key points raised through the feedback received as part of their promise to continuously improve.

End users told them that they want and need more information about how the compensation scheme claim and appeals processes work. Their first step has been to produce a comprehensive suite of diagrams that illustrate the flow of a claim or an appeal, and what happens as the application is considered and processed. The diagrams show what information is needed to accurately consider an application and where we get that from, in order to ensure that claimants receive what they are eligible for and entitled to, in accordance with legislation.

They want to be transparent and by sharing what they do with each of the claims, they hope that they can work together, with end users, to ensure their claims are dealt with quickly and accurately.

Coming soon are some bite-size videos, the first of which will provide more advice on starting

a claim and providing the detail and information at the first point of contact, to ensure we can begin processing it straight away - these will be available shortly.

we struggle to get to grips with Facebook, with app-this, and app-that, download this-that-and-the other, we need to be constantly vigilant about our online presence and how we react online to the confusion of stuff that is thrown at us online. If companies such as Apple can miss security flaws, then we have less of a chance.

However, there are defences out there that you can have on your PC/laptop/mobile phones that can protect against nefarious actors and keep your personal data safe. There is lots of information on the internet to help you protect your technology and your online presence. Here are a few guides to assist:

**1. Use Strong Passwords:** The most common way to protect your online identity is to focus on creating strong passwords. When creating a password, choose something that will not be easily cracked or decoded. Never use a word or number that someone can associate with you such as a first, middle, or last name, a spouse or child's name, address, phone numbers, employers, or other identifying letters or numbers. Mix up the letters and numbers used in your password and use symbols and a combination of upper and lowercase numbers, when possible, in order to protect yourself from online security breaches. Additionally, it is important to never share your password with anyone. It might be necessary to change your passwords a few times each year.

**2. Look for Encryption:** Before making any sort of financial transaction online, look for signs that show whether the website is encrypted or not. To do this, look for two things: the trusted security lock symbols and the extra "s" at the end of http in the URL or web address bar. When you are on the page that's asking for your

credit card information, the "http" changes to "https" when it is a secure site. At the same time, a lock symbol will also appear on the right side of the address bar or at the bottom left of your browser window. These two signals show that the site is encrypted, which means nobody will be able to see information as it's sent to the website owner. This keeps your name, phone number, address, credit card number and other sensitive information from being seen by anyone else.

**3. Install Security Suites:** Security suites are security programs that keep dishonest people and programs from infecting your computer and stealing information and data from you. This includes blocking harmful software such as spyware, viruses, and phishing scams that can be installed secretly when you are online. Some of the popular security suites include Total AV, Norton Antivirus, McAfee Virus Protection, Ad-Aware Pro Security, and AVG Internet Security. Be sure to purchase and install one of these suites to protect your personal information online.

**4. Turn on Web Browser Blacklisting:** The lack of internet security is partially due to the internet browser being used. Many web browsers have additional security options such as blacklisting. This allows you to set the criteria for sites you will be navigating; only secure, trusted sites will be available to visit.

**5. Avoid Phishing Scams:** Phishing scams use a variety of methods to obtain your personal information and steal your identity. There are many different phishing scams out there, but they can be avoided by educating yourself on how to recognize them. To avoid being the victim of a phishing scam never open emails or attachments when the

sender is unknown and don't click on unsecure links from strange emails. Additionally, avoid anyone offering money, unfamiliar job opportunities or requests for donations to charities as this might be a plot to obtain your personal information and online identity.

**6. Get Private Data Protection:** Another way to protect your online identity and sensitive information when sharing it online is to get private data protection. This type of security suite will protect any private data that is included in emails, private messenger programs, social media sites, or in various blogs. By employing a private data protection suite, you can further prevent hackers from gathering your personal information.

**7. Password-Protect Your Wireless Router:** A wireless router that accesses the internet at your home or business should always be password-protected. When you do not have a password on your wireless network, anyone in your range can use and access your internet, even a hacker. A hacker with experience committing cybercrimes will use this to their advantage and steal information from your computer while accessing your router. You should also enable the encryption feature on the wireless router, which scrambles any data you send online to further protect your sensitive data.

**8. Hide Your Personal Information:** It is possible to accidentally share your personal information with others if you don't set up your web browser properly. Any time you get a new computer or download and install a new browser, you can first configure it. To do this, you will access the "set-up" option on the browser and choose to configure the browser so that it doesn't

## Report by Historical Secretary

Earlier in the year I was searching the web and found that there are digitised Army Lists covering the period from 1839 to 1950 available on the National Library for Scotland website. These Lists mainly concern officers, however, from around WW1 they also started to list Warrant Officers Class 1 from all Regiments and Corps. I have begun to go through the entries and found that there are SM(AC)s listed under the Royal Artillery as well as, in some instances, "Superintending Clerks". This is not a term that I have previously heard associated with the Royal Regiment and an initial search of the Association records does not return any of the named personnel listed. This does not necessarily mean that they were not members of the Royal Regiment as it could

just be a reflection of the lack of completeness of my lists.

As the days get shorter, I will start to work my way through this valuable source of information and add it to our records. In the meantime, if anyone reading this article can shed any light on the use of the title 'Superintending Clerk' in the Royal Regiment I would very much like to hear from you.

The same site also contains War Office Casualty Lists for 1917 and 1918, and I have taken a quick look at them. As you might expect they are huge and so far, I have been unable to identify details of any Artillery Clerks killed in action or dying from their wounds. This is probably because, whilst abbreviated ranks are given, appointments are not and, therefore, an AC would not stand out in the same way that they do on other lists. Even a cursory look at these lists is sobering, especially when you see the long lists of names against many Infantry Battalions.

The Red Cypher charity has been set up to aid and support the serving soldiers and former members of the Regiment. The evening consisted of a guided tour of the Tower and access to the Ceremony of the Keys followed by a few social drinks in the Cross Keys the Yeoman Warders bar and I am reliably informed the cheapest pub in London. asked if we could come along to Sheffield on 12th July when Ben was to carry the Birmingham 2022 Queen's Platinum Jubilee baton as part of the events leading up to the Commonwealth Games. Ben had hoped to carry the baton and walk either unaided or just using one crutch whilst carrying the baton and had practised on his drive at home using a broom shank to replicate the baton. Unfortunately, the broom shank did not in any way replicate the baton which was quite heavy and the driveway at home did not replicate the route he had been given to walk which had quite a steep incline. He initially struggled and, on several occasions, almost fell over as he struggled to hold the baton in one hand and attempted to walk without the aid of crutches. Eventually, the staff from the Commonwealth Games baton relay provided him with a device that strapped over his shoulder/chest and held the baton in place and Ben much to his frustration agreed to use his crutches with my friend and I providing verbal encouragement and support. There was a large crowd of school children watching the event which was also been covered by tv news and reporters. As Ben was nearing the end of his section of the relay he looked to be struggling and my friend went in front of him and produced a Regimental flag, as soon as Ben's eye's caught sight of the flag it was as if he had got a second wind and he powered forward to the end of the designated route. It was very humbling to witness the sheer effort and determination put in to complete the event by Ben and quite inspirational and emotional to have been involved.

Look forward to seeing everyone at the 2023 Reunion Dinner, in the meantime take care of yourselves and best wishes to you all.

# The Artillery Clerks' Association Silver Centrepiece Project

## Background

The designation of “the Artillery Clerks’ Section” was first created under Army Order 54 of 1903 and remained in force until the establishment of the Adjutant’s General Corps in 1992. Having proudly served the Royal Regiment of Artillery for 83 years, the cohort of Artillery Clerks were required to change their cap badge and allegiance and complete their individual service chiefly within the Staff and Personnel Support arm of the newly formed Corps.

All Artillery Clerks were enlisted primarily as Artillerymen before being selected to assume the essential administrative and personnel support duties within the various Headquarters and Field and Training Regiments of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, leaning on their personal pride to serve and support others as enthusiastic members of the Gunner family around the world in peace time and on active service.

From after WW2, it looks possible that the status of Artillery Clerk was only bestowed on those soldiers in the Royal Artillery who attained the educational and clerical grades in the rank of Sergeant through to Warrant Officer Class 1, and this became the norm from the 1950s. This unique privilege served to create a “special bond” which exists to this day.

The Artillery Clerks’ Association was formed in Woolwich in 1998 and next year (2023) marks our 25th anniversary. The Association members are determined to preserve their proud heritage as well as the memory and role played by Artillery Clerks in the last century.

## Critical Path and Timeline

**11th August 2021** – The Chairman informed the Association Committee that there was a desire amongst members to commission a Silver Centrepiece to commemorate the Artillery Clerks’ Association 25th Anniversary and that the proposed design will be published on the website and will be discussed further at the Reunion in June 2022.

**9th September 2021** – Leo Lyall presented his initial sketches of the proposed Centrepiece for consideration. The draft design and specifications were agreed in principle and presented without obligation to a supplier in search for a quote.

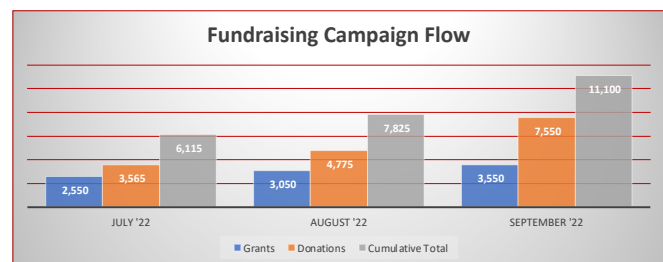
10th March 2022 – Final agreed sketches provided by Leo were circulated to members through social media.

**5th April 2022** – A computer aided design (CAD) representing the proposed Centrepiece was circulated on social media.

**19th April 2022** – Paul Corker informed by HMRC that Gift Aid will be applicable on all personal contributions to the Project by members and honorary members.

**11th June 2022** - At the AGM members voted unanimously to commission the proposed silver centrepiece to coincide with the 25th Anniversary of the formation of the Association in 2023.

An ambitious campaign was launched to raise **the projected cost of £8,760** (including VAT) needed to complete the final design and commission this new silver centrepiece.



**June – September 2022** -The initial grant of £1500 from our own General Purpose Fund (GPF) was quickly followed by a grant of £750 from the Royal Artillery Association (RAA). Momentum gathered as 3 more Corporate grants and personal contributions from members and honorary members ensured that the funds required to reach the original target of £8,760 would be met.

**27th September 2022** – Proposals tabled by Dennis Norris that (1) the Silver Centrepiece be commissioned and that (2) delegated authority be vested to the Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Webmaster and Robbie Astick (The Project Team) to manage the Project were unanimously supported by the Association Committee.

– The Chairman announced that the Silver Centrepiece project had seamlessly moved into the Commissioning Phase. The final agreed design is opposite:

The only meaningful change from the original design is the introduction of a single drawer fitted to the bottom plinth housing a silver name plate acknowledging by name all those who have contributed to the



Fund. Another variation is that the 5mm letters “AC” mounted underneath the silver crossed quills will be gold plated and the three 2” engraved crests RA – RHA – RAA will be infilled with gold. These variations have moved the overall costs (including Perspex clear cover, wooden storage carry box and VAT) from £8760 to £9980 (a difference of £1220).

# Update on 34 (Seringapatam) Battery, 14 Regiment Royal Artillery

As current events have shown the world is more unstable and unpredictable than ever, with threats being posed across the spectrum from Cyber, land, air and the maritime. With economies and global supplies more interconnected than ever before the ripples of wars within one country have been shown to impact those around the world with more impact than ever. NATO is being tested for the first time since the cold war with global powers having to reassess their contributions to national defence and global security. The British Army knows it must shape its structure and equipment more expediently, with emphasis on technology and future capabilities that will protect the soldier, attrite the enemy and ultimately win the battle. While technology can never replace a well trained and motivated soldier it can make the individual more lethal, increasing their ability to find, understand and strike.

It is within this environment and with this intent that 34 (SERINGAPATAM) Bty has looked to change at a pace of relevance, considering how fires can deliver more accurately with greater mass, while also increasing the survivability of its soldiers and equipment.

Over the past year 34 (SERINGAPATAM) Bty has gone through significant change, picking up the responsibility for leading with the development of future capabilities for the Gunners has led to substantial challenge for all members of the army's

only artillery Innovation and Experimentation Bty.

This past year has seen the Bty conducting significant live fire deployments in a number of new and challenging environments, including rural and urban locations. This has introduced significant complexity to the delivery of accurate and timely fires, demanding the soldiers and officers consider the full gambit of current and future enemy capabilities. Having to defend against air and ground attack from both manned and unmanned platforms has led to significant leaps in tactics and doctrine.

The brilliance of the soldiers within the Bty was best shown on the URBAN TIGER exercise where the Bty deployed into the urban sprawl, not only focused on training artillery tactics in the urban but also honing Close Quarter Battle skills (CQB) as dismounted infantry.

Having set the conditions through hard work and diligence the Bty is now set to move to its next phase from September, becoming part of the Next Generation Combat Team (NGCT) the 2YORKS led Battle Group responsible for the delivery of pan army future capability in 2025. This role will see the FST deploying to the US on Project Convergence (the US main experimental ex in California), The BC and his HQ deploying to Germany as part of Ex CERBERUS and the Gun line continue its work with the Royal Artillery Trials and Development Unit. This will involve the testing

of new carrier shells, enhanced exoskeletons for soldiers and close support to DSTL on the future fires' platform.

Within the NGCT the Bty will develop and refine tactics and doctrine that will directly support the conversion of 16 Air Assault Brigade to a Robotic and Autonomous enabled combat team (RAS) by 2025. This will see the Bty leading on the trialling of new technology harnessing UAS, AFVs and new data communications in the pursuit of the competitive edge.

Holding the core principles of Artillery at its heart, the Bty has begun the journey into the future for the wider Royal Artillery. Its work will inform and shape future procurement of technology and platforms, ensuring the Deep Recce Strike Brigade has the very best in Find and Fires capabilities allowing it to meet the future threat head on and win.

# 34 (Seringapatam) Battery, 14 Regiment Royal Artillery

The last Gun Salute to take place at Stonehenge was in 2018 to mark the 100th Anniversary of the ending of the First World War. Fast forward to June 2nd, 2022, and 34 'Seringapatam' Battery were once again rolling through the gates of Stonehenge, guns in tow, No. 2 Dress gleaming and with a sense of pride amongst the troops. The Battery delighted in having the prestigious privilege of marking Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee in front of the stones with a 42 Gun Salute. It was an honour for all in the Battery, to be on the world stage celebrating this impressive milestone. After a brief long weekend, 34 was back, nose to the



grindstone and deploying on our Live Fire serials in support of the Royal School of Artillery (RSA). Owing to our access to ammunition, training areas and equipment, these Live Fire serials provide 34 with the perfect opportunity to explore and refine new ways of employing a Close Support Battery within current doctrine. Throughout these serials during the summer term, 34 tested the deployment of NLAW, the Next Generation Light Anti-Tank Weapon, on the gun line, using it as part of the defence of the gun position. Providing the gun line with the ability to defend itself against, and



kill, armour is pivotal and has been proven in recent conflicts in Europe. The Battery is looking forward to furthering its title as the Innovation and Experimentation lead of the Royal Artillery with upcoming trips to Germany and California USA, in support of 2 YORKS and the Next Generation Combat Team.

Unique to the summer term was the Battery's involvement in Op Interflex, the British-led multinational military operation to train and support the Armed Forces of Ukraine. Op Interflex saw the delivery of 50 L119 Light Guns to Salisbury Plain, donated by the Royal Regiment of New Zealand Artillery, along with a team of 29 Kiwi instructors. 34 Battery provided the safety teams, who were concerned with the safe planning, control and conduct of the L119 firing. It was a fantastic opportunity, not only to meet and learn from the some 500 Ukrainian 'gunners', but to feel a great sense of achievement in supporting Op Interflex and Ukraine as a whole in their current conflict. This role was even conducted over the weekends! It showed a tremendous devotion to duty from those involved at 34!

When we weren't out on ceremonial duties, live firing or in support of a partner-nation, 34 Battery were up to all sorts of extra-mural activities. Sgt Davies organised an incredibly successful charity event in Salisbury Town Centre. The day saw members of the Battery cycle 1241.4 miles and row 76.7 miles within 12 hours. These figures derived from the latitude and longitude of Srirangapatna, India, known to us by its colonial name, 'Seringapatam'. A respectful £806.21 was raised and donated to the Royal Artillery Charitable Fund, who are there to help our serving or veteran Gunners and their dependants when they are struggling to find funding for essential needs. It was an enjoyable day for all, with keen competition being seen amongst the officer cohort; Lt Wicks leading the way with an impressive stint on the rowing machine! More good news! The summer term saw the Battery Football team making it to the final round of the Inter-Battery Shield, where they lost narrowly to F Bty, 7 PARA RHA. It was an impressive season on the pitch! Gnr Maloney continued these successes, making it into the Gunner Football squad. On a similar note, Gunners Moroca and Stratford Dunks (Female Captain), LBdr Chance, LBdr Carden and Lt McCarthy played Gunner Rugby, whilst Sgt Lotawa coached the Gunner Rugby 7's team. LBdr's Munenga and Robertson, Bdr Gilson and 2Lt Ellis also represented the Gunners in Tug of War, competing at the Inter-Corps Championship with much success. LBdr Munenga deserves a special mention for representing the Army



Tug of War Team. In addition to this, the Battery saw 6 promotions over the summer term, a brilliant achievement to all respectively.

It is rather interesting that we started the summer term with such a prestigious event, in the form of HM The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, and that we have too started this winter term with an event of such enormity. The death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was felt keenly by the soldiers and officers of 34 'Seringatam'



Battery. To find themselves given the responsibility of helping a nation remember one of the most important parts of our countries shared identity and history was a task that no member of the Battery took lightly. Poignant for the members of the 34 both Junior and Senior, the salute presented an opportunity for all to consider what Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II represented not only to the Army, but the Nation as a whole. Reminded of the core values of the British Army; Courage, Discipline, Respect for Others, Integrity, Loyalty, and Selfless Commitment it is difficult to think of a single person who has embodied these qualities more perfectly and honestly than Her Majesty.

## 4. Agenda Item 4 - Approval of the Minutes of the Virtual Annual General Meeting (AGM) held on Saturday 12th June 2021.

- 4.1 The Chairman said that the Minutes of the Virtual AGM held on Saturday 12th June 2021 had been circulated in advance via Crossed Quills (Issue 25) and that it was not intended to read them at the meeting.
- 4.2 A proposal by Richard Horne, seconded by Mike Grenham to confirm that the Minutes were a true and accurate record was CARRIED Unanimously.

## 5. Agenda Item 5 - Matters Arising from the Minutes of the Virtual AGM held on Saturday 12th June 2021.

- 5.1 There were no matters arising from the Minutes of the Virtual AGM held on Saturday 21st June 2021 which were not included in the Agenda. The Chairman brought to the attention of those present the following three outstanding matters:
- a. A discussion on the 25th Anniversary Reunion Weekend was included under Any Other Business (AOB).
  - b. The Treasurer will outline the actions that have been taken regarding suspensions.
  - c. There will be an update by the Secretary in his report on the proposal by Stephen Read, who had asked the Committee if it would not be possible for membership to be granted to Honorary members for a longer period than the current 3 year with an annual review thereafter.

## 6. Agenda Item 6 - Chairman's Report

- 6.1 The Chairman mentioned that the past two years have not been easy as everyone had been impacted, in one way or another, by the pandemic. No sooner did we recover from all the restrictions which had become the norm that the worries about the cost of living, rising inflation and the war in Ukraine emerged to take away the gloss and, in some cases, the hope, of a better future.
- 6.2 However, the Association remains in good shape with progress achieved on many fronts by the Committee, including tackling the issues of suspensions and honorary membership.
- 6.3 The Chairman added that:
- 6.3.1 The relationship with our affiliated Battery had been strengthened and that the BC and BSM of 34 Battery will be amongst our guests for the Dinner. This renewed bond was clearly demonstrated by the equipment display the Bty laid on for the Association earlier in the day.
  - 6.3.2 Our social media, be it Crossed Quills, the website or FB, have received praise from many outside the Association – a most recent comment said “what an impressive website your Association has! The sheer professionalism of the website is excellent. I have rarely seen one so good!”
  - 6.3.3 The Quarterly Newsletter has remained as a source of timely updates throughout the year. The Chairman also recommended the informal Weekly Catch-up on MS Teams (Sunday evenings at 7pm) – we need more members to join in the banter!!!
  - 6.3.4 We have continued our representational work. Last year, together with Andrew Jones, the Chairman attended the RA Service of Remembrance at the NMA and St Barbara's Day at Larkhill.
  - 6.3.5 Richard Horner is now a member of a Royal Artillery Association Working Group set up by the Regimental Secretary to find ways of sharing best practice.
  - 6.3.6 And of course, members enjoyed a terrific reunion dinner in October in the company of the Regimental Colonel, Colonel Sam Shepherd as our Guest of Honour.
- 6.4 The Chairman concluded that the members have a lot to celebrate and with a lot more to come next year. He mentioned that none of this would have been possible without the full support and commitment of all the Committee Members. All of us owe Andy Tibble, Leo Lyall, Paul Corker, Roy Deal, Dennis Norris, Steve Read, Ron Holmes and Andrew Jones a huge amount of gratitude for all they do behind the scenes.

## 7. Agenda Item 7 - Secretary's Report

- 7.1 The Secretary, Mr Andy Tibble MVO MSM made the following comments:
- **Membership.** The membership of The Association currently stands at 137.

- **New Members.** Former WO2 (QMS(AC)) Gil O'Mallo who joined us on the 27th August 2021. Gil lives in Fordingbridge, Hampshire
  - **Deaths.**
    - Former WO2 (QMS(AC)) Michael Hopkins who passed away on 16th March 2022 (Not a member)
    - Former Sgt (AC) Steve Paton who passed away some 4/5 years ago. No details are available.
  - **Honours & Awards.** Nothing to report.
  - **Promotions.** Nothing to report.
  - **Membership – Wanted List.** The Secretary explained that there are currently 205 potential members listed on “The Wanted List” who were former ‘Artillery Clerks.’ He urged everyone to look through the list which was published in the ‘2021 Crossed Quills’ to see if they recognise anyone who might be living nearby, and then to try to encourage them to join the Association.
  - **Change in personal details.** The Secretary asked to be kept informed of any changes of rank, address, telephone numbers, email addresses, awards etc, etc. All members present were asked to send their current email addresses to the Secretary.

The Service will be followed by lunch in the Officers' Mess. Further details will follow in due course, however, all members, especially those living close to Larkhill were encouraged to attend. The Secretary urged anyone who was considering attending to inform him as soon as possible so that he could reserve places at the Service.
- **Artillery Clerks' Association Website.** The Secretary mentioned that the Artillery Clerks' Association Website was constantly being kept updated by the Webmaster and that it contained a lot of useful information and links that is for the good and benefit of our members. He urged all members to visit the website on a regular basis as well as the Crossed Quills on Facebook. The Secretary went onto thank Mr Leo Lyall, Webmaster for all the hard work that he had done to ensure that we have an excellent website.

## 8. Agenda Item 8 - Assistant/Reunion Secretary's Reports

- 8.1 **Assistant Secretary's Report.** The Assistant Secretary, Mr Roy Deal MBE, informed those present that those members wishing to place an order for ties should contact him direct on either roydeal@hotmail.co.uk or Roy.deal288@mod.gov.uk

- 8.2 The Assistant Secretary went on to say that members should wear the Association tie with pride during the Reunion and at any social gatherings, to clearly show that we are an elite Association and proud to be so. He urged those who have managed to hang onto the older versions and new recently joined members to invest in the new high-quality version for the next Reunion.
- 8.3 **Reunion Secretary's Report.** The Reunion Secretary mentioned that he continues to try and keep within a budget for the dinner night. He said that keeping the costs at a reasonable level remains a constant challenge whilst maintaining the standards of a full Regimental Mess Dinner night we all come to expect. He went on to provide an update on the evening and those guests attending.
- 8.4 The Reunion Secretary then:

**Proposed that any expenditure for the 2022 Reunion Dinner, (be capped once again at £50 for those attending), that exceeded the income generated is covered by the GPF up to a maximum of £1500. (Afternote: The 2022 Reunion Dinner account has now been balanced and the total spent came to £1133.55)**

**This was proposed was seconded by Ron Holmes, put to the vote, and CARRIED Unanimously.**

**Proposed that £1000 be transferred from GPF to cover any additional weekend costs for the 25th Anniversary from the 23rd – 25th June 2023.**

**This was proposed by Joe Falzon and seconded by Ron Holmes, put to the vote, and CARRIED Unanimously.**

- 8.5 **RAA Grants.** Lt Col Richard Horner mentioned that the RAA had funding available to assist Association with their annual reunions and suggested that the Committee should apply to the RAA for a grant to cover some of the costs for the 25th Anniversary Reunion next year.

## 9. Agenda Item 10 - Treasurer's Report

- 9.1 Maj (Retd) Paul Corker, presented the following Liquidity State as at 11th June 2022:

9.2 He particularly emphasised that:

- **Subscriptions.** Total outstanding subscriptions is £1,625. Only 8 from 2022.
- **Mandate.** 11 members are not paying by the Standing Order Mandate. Members are continuously encouraged to subscribe by this method.
- **Gift Aid.** Until 2013 the fund received £2,374:81 from HMRC. Charity status was granted to the Association in 2020, therefore Gift Aid may once again be claimed. In 2021 the Fund received £465.67. The claim will be submitted annually in January. There are 20 members who have not signed up to the Gift Aid Scheme.
- **Suspensions.** In accordance with the Association's policy on suspension, the Treasurer has written to all members who have not paid their subscriptions for a period of 3 years. There are currently 60 members shown as 'suspended'. There were 2 in 2022
- **Treasurer's Updates.** All members are reminded of their subscriptions within the Crossed Quills, the Association's Website and at the AGM. They are also invited to join the mandate system and Gift Aid.
- **2021 Income and Expenditure Report (As at 31 Dec 21 submitted to the RAA).** The Treasurer said that the financial report, which was submitted to the RAA, shoes an end state in 2020 as:

- **Insurance.** The insurance for the fund is valid until 31 Mar 23. It is with the firm Towergate Wilsons. The cost this year was £331:80. This includes personal accident cover for the Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Reunion Secretary, Standard Bearer and Regional Secretaries.
- **Shop.** Shop stock consists of 15 ties @ £20:00, therefore totaling £300.00. There are no cuff links and lapel pins remaining.
- **Support to the RAA.** The Association, via the Secretary continues to support the RAA when called upon to do so.
- **Concluding Remarks.** The Treasurer urges Members to change their Standing Orders to £15. He undertook to continue to chase outstanding subscriptions and those who have been paying £5



from 2013 and now the change to £15 from 2019. Suspensions will be implemented, when necessary. Gift Aid will be claimed annually in January.

***Steve Seymour proposed and Dennis Norris seconded that the `Treasurer's Report is accepted. This proposal was put to the vote and CARRIED unanimously.***

- 9.3 The Chairman thanked the Association Treasurer for his concise report and for all the work he carries out on behalf of the Association.

## **10. Welfare Secretary's Report.**

- 10.1 The Welfare Secretary, Mr Dennis Norris, informed those present that the Covid Pandemic is slowly but surely receding and with the ongoing vaccination programme well and truly underway we are getting back to some sort of normality. He went on to mention that we should remember that we did lose one member to the pandemic (David Hamilton) and a number of members suffered from hospital admission to a version of "man flu" and there will be some members still suffering the after effects known as 'long Covid'.
- 10.2 He mentioned that the world is changing with the ongoing war in the Ukraine. He recalled that General Granville-Chapman when MGRA and the Guest of Honour at our Association dinner a few years ago stated during his speech that although the cold war was over, the main threat to NATO still came from Russia and he was correct. The War in the Ukraine has had a global impact on fuel and food prices dragging millions into fuel and food poverty. Although the majority of our Association members are financially secure there will be other veterans who may not be so fortunate and are looking for help.
- 10.3 He added that the Veteran's Gateway is the conduit for any individuals to seek support when needed. The Veterans Gateway can be found using any search engine and there is a link from our own Association website. The Veterans Gateway landing page states:

*"We put veterans and their families in touch with the organisations best placed to help with the information, advice and support they need – from healthcare and housing to employability, finances, personal relationships and more."*

The Veterans Gateway has links to some useful organisations that can offer help, advice and support for Veterans in financial hardship.

- 10.4 The Welfare Secretary concluded his report by inviting members to feel free to pass on his information to any of their veteran friends that they feel may need support.

## **11. Historical Secretary's Report**

- 11.1 The Historical Secretary, Mr Stephen Read, informed those present that slow but steady progress continues in developing the historical records of the Association. There have been no major new developments over the past 12 months although the Secretary has provided a rich source of information relating to previous dinners.
- 11.2 He invited any members who have yet to provide their service details for the Artillery Clerks family tree to get in touch. He also urged anyone who is aware of any web or paper-based resources that might give an insight into the history of the Artillery Clerks as individuals, or as a group, to pass details on to him.


## **12. Webmaster's Report**

- 12.1 The Webmaster, Mr Leo Lyall, informed those present that the Association website is now a stable state and I receive little information to make any changes. Thus, it has had minimal updates since the Xmas report. Changes made have been to the Notices, the Treasurer, and Reunion pages.

- 12.2 The MS Teams site was taken down earlier this year due to minimal usage with the Association not able to justify the cost of the licence from Microsoft to run it. Those that have MS Teams or Zoom can still communicate with each other if they wish to do so. There is still a weekly meeting set up every Sunday by the Association Secretary. So, if you'd like to partake, please send him a message at **secretary@artyclerkassn.org** where he will send you the appropriate invite.
- 12.3 The Association newsletter is still published quarterly. This, along with other supplementary editions for important announcements are seen as a direct way of keeping members up to date with the Association. For a recap on any newsletter's that have been published there is a list at: **<https://www.artyclerkassn.org/webpages/newsletter.htm>**
- 12.4 Since the 2021 AGM several members of the Association have been involved in forging ahead with the plans for the 25th Anniversary Silver piece. My involvement was the production of the design drawings of the envisaged piece and subsequent alterations and modifications of the said drawings. These along with the information fliers have proved invaluable to the silversmiths who will produce the piece and for helping secure valuable donations towards the cost of the production of the final piece. The CAD video that was produced by an outside source really capture the drawings perfectly and brought the piece to life.

**Design Details**


- The silver section will depict the crossed quills sitting on a silver base, the letters "AC" underneath it raised at an angle so it is visible while looking at it front on.
- This silver base will have the Royal Artillery badge engraved on the front centre, the Royal Horse Artillery badge to the right, the Royal Artillery Association cypher to the left, and the Army Order on the back (see over for detailed drawings).
- There will be a wooded base to rest the silver piece on as shown in the images which will have cannon ball feet.
- A silver plate attached to the front of the wood base will depict the details what the piece is about – wording shown below left.
- A silver plate attached to the rear of the wood base will depict the Army Order 54 of 1903 – wording shown below right.
- The Crossed Quills would be enclosed by a Perspex case.

- 12.6 The Chairman thanked the Webmaster for everything that he has done and continues to do with the website on behalf of the Association as Treasurer.

### 13. Germany Secretary's Report.

- 13.1 The Germany Secretary, Mr Ron Holmes, informed those present that he intends to organise a Germany AC Reunion either in the last week of November 2022 or first week of December 2022 in Bielefeld, to coincide with the annual Christmas Markets. The Reunion weekend will include wives.
- 13.2 He went on to mention that Sennelager is now the main area for British Forces in Germany.

## 15. Any other Business

15.1 **Association 25th Anniversary Reunion Weekend – 23rd – 25th June 2023.** The Chairman highlighted that the Association would be celebrating its 25th Anniversary in 2023. He took the opportunity to ask if any members were interested in being part of a Steering Committee which would assist the existing Committee with the project.

15.2 Updates on the proposed silver piece were provided as follows:

- **Royal Artillery Association (RAA).** The Chairman mentioned that the Association had applied for a grant from the RAA to help defray the cost of the proposed Silver Centrepiece. The RAA Trustees approved the application with a grant of £500.
- **Detailed Costs and Critical Deadlines.** The Secretary informed those present that the cost of the Silver Centrepiece, as illustrated in the drawing and as per the CAD, would be £8760 which includes VAT. The order would need to be placed by the 1st October 2022 in order for the Silver Centrepiece to be ready in May 2023. As the RAA had provided a grant of £500 towards this, invoices would have to be submitted to the RAA by the 1st December 2022.
- **Treasurers Update.** The Treasurer provided those present with the following update:

**Robbie Astick proposed that the Artillery Clerks' Association donates £1500 toward the Silver Centrepiece from the GPF to the Silver Fund. The proposal was seconded by Mick Grenham, put to the vote, and CARRIED unanimously.**

***(Afternote: The fund currently stands at £3,800.00, made up from individual Donations, grants and Gift Aid. Regular updates will be posted on the website as more donations are received)***

- **Gift Aid.** The Treasurer will check with HMRC whether Gift Aid can be claimed from the donations that are received.

***(Afternote: HMRC have now confirmed that Gift Aid is recoverable for individual donations received in the Silver Fund.)***

- **Donations.** The Treasurer mentioned that information on how to make donations towards the Silver Centrepiece will be published on the website which will include a donation button facility.

***(Afternote: This information has now been circulated via the website.)***

- **Fundraising Update.** Mr Robbie Astick provided those present with an update on fundraising to date. He mentioned that he had sent out 81 letters to various organisations including Livery Companies and that 21 rejections had been received to that appeal. He went on to say that if anyone had any ideas that they get in touch with him as soon as possible.

## **16. RAA Working Group Update**

16.1 Lt Col Richard Horner informed those present that he had been asked to be part of the RAA Working Group and provided the following update:

- The RAA confirmed that the Artillery Clerks' Association is a national arm of the RAA.
- All gunners are members of the RAA from the date of enlistment and can benefit from its charitable awards.
- The overall perception, for a number of reasons, is that the RAA Branch structure is in decline. There is a desire to adjust the Association (of many rules and regulations) to meet potential members' expectations in the digital era.
- There are a number of past and present members and disbanded regimental and battery reunion groups that do not wish to become formal members of the current RAA structure. These are the kind of individuals and groups the RAA should be attracting.
- The Working Group consider that these groups could still be supported, as they consisted of veteran members, but did not necessarily have to become formal branches of the RAA. There is therefore no reason why these groups cannot apply for funding for certain activities.
- The RAA is the delivery arm of the Royal Artillery Charitable Fund (RACF). The fund was established at the end of WW2. Due to shrewd investment over the years the RACF still has circa £45M of welfare funds.
- The two big areas of concerns are communications and outreach. These must move with the

times and communicated through the revised RAA website and outreach through the utilisation of various social media and online forums.

## 17. Date of Next Meeting
