It seems incredible that it was 10 years ago that we pulled out of Helmand, having been there for 8 hard and long years. The implications of that war, and the casualties that came from it, are still with us and will be for some time. Some say the withdrawal emboldened Putin to take the Crimea in 2014, taking advantage of a supposed defeat for the West, with the tragic consequence of so little reaction that he was further emboldened to take on the whole of Ukraine just 8 years later. Some say that it led to a re-appraisal of Defence's approach and the eventual 'pivot to the Pacific' and concerns about the security of Taiwan which seems to have dominated Defence thinking for at least 5 years.

The threads are coming together in many ways. The new government has launched a Strategic Defence Review (SDR), which is different for a number of reasons. First it is a defence

review, a review of how Defence works and operates, rather than the last few Security and Defence Reviews (SDSR) which looked at Britain's place in the world. This one is very much about how to govern and manage Defence as an entity in its own right and how it will operate. As such, part of its remit is looking at recruiting, skills and people matters, so rare in previous SDSRs. It is also being led by experts from outside defence, including our own General Sir Richard Barrons. The review will be in full swing by the time you read this, but it is heartening that they have called for evidence from those concerned about Defence. Let's hope it delivers a more robust and better run defence for all our security and for that of our partners in the support of Ukraine.

Another thread is that of casualties. It is only now, with the war in Ukraine and in the Middle East showing how difficult medical recovery can be, that we can appreciate quite how superb our teams were in Helmand and in the closing stages of Iraq, with the imperative to get casualties to a hospital within a Golden Hour;


for soldiers in Ukraine it can take 2 days to get to Kiev to a hospital. On this theme, it is wonderful that the Invictus Games will be coming back to the UK – Birmingham – in 2027, so we can celebrate the great achievements of our wounded brethren not just at the Paralympics, but also on our own soil.

A new Government, extraordinary and unexpected successes at the Olympics, and a summer that didn't, in the end, break any records for heat or floods, there is much to look forward to. The spirit of serving soldiers and veterans is to be positive about what is around the next corner, whatever it might bring!

I would particularly like to thank the Chairman and Secretary for their unstinting work on all our behalf, and very much hope they can take great pride in what they do for the Association, as they deserve to. And as ever, I wish you all a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year and very much hope to see you at the Reunion Dinner in 2025.

There are currently 11 Association members on the 'radar' of the Welfare Secretary and Committee predominantly with conditions ranging from Cancers, Heart conditions and other debilitating illnesses. These conditions are being managed through medical services but, if you are aware of any member suffering, a contact call and a chat, or even a friendly exchange on social media can go a long way to make the sufferer feel better and ensuring they do not suffer alone.

As always, the Committee and myself are always available for a Welfare Support contact plus SSAFA has long been the primary support for the Armed Services and their website is well worth a visit if you feel you need further help. Below is an extract from the site regarding help and support with mobility:

Help with Mobility

Helping veterans maintain their independence and dignity.

My SSAFA caseworker has been a guardian angel! This chair has really made my life so much easier.

Our volunteers have plenty of experience in finding solutions for veterans seeking financial support to help maintain their mobility and independence at home.

Whether your mobility problems are caused by getting older or an existing medical condition, our volunteers are trained to help you get the equipment that you need, including mobility scooters, stairlifts and recliner chairs.

SSAFA's services are only available to people who have received at least one day's pay from the Armed Forces (British Army, Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, Royal Marines, including Reserves), or are in the immediate family of someone who served.

Defence Medical Welfare Service (DMWS)

Defence Medical Welfare Service (DMWS) is an independent charity providing medical welfare to those who have, and continue to, serve on the frontline. Their services are proven to help people:

- Have better experiences of healthcare and recover from illness quicker
- Feel less stressed and anxious
- Access financial support to reduce the stress of money
- Feel less lonely and more connected to their communities
- Enjoy positive relationships with families and friends
- Find and stay in safe housing
- Overcome alcohol and drug misuse
- Access treatment for mental health illnesses such as PTSD
- Stop thoughts of taking their
- Find meaningful employment or volunteering after service

They support all members of the Armed Forces Community across the services, including serving personnel, reservists, veterans, and their family members/carers.

DMWS has provided a professional and confidential medical welfare service to the Armed Forces since 1943. With the number of veterans of all ages continuously growing, there is an increased demand for their professional service to support this community when they are receiving medical treatment.

Any hospital admissions or a programme of treatment can be a stressful and daunting experience. Being a veteran can bring its own set of challenges; returning home from combat, many suffer from ill mental health and often find it difficult to transition into civilian life. This can lead to other problems such as marriage breakdown, unemployment and homelessness.

Combined with the transient nature of service life, veterans are less likely to have family nearby or a long established support network, leading to loneliness and isolation; all of which can hamper recovery.

Veteran's health needs are significant; in general, veterans often experience physical health issues linked to their service, such as:

- Combat related injuries and back problems from carrying heavy equipment
- Ear, nose and throat problems
- Sleep disorders
- Chronic pain problems
- Mental health problems

DMWS welfare staff are available for veterans to offer practical and emotional support when they receive medical treatment. The aim is to improve mental wellbeing, encourage a positive approach to treatment, reduce social isolation, and promote independence which can lead to earlier hospital discharge. Our person-centred service is tailored to the individual needs of the patient and their family.

As usual I'd like to add a piece to my report regarding cyber security. It is so important that you are as aware of your personal security online as you would have been of your personal security while serving. You were provided with measures to take to ensure your safety in line with the environment you were working in. This is all the more important on the Internet. I interpret the WWW and the Wild-Wild-West. Staying safe online is essential to protect your personal information, maintain your privacy, and avoid becoming a victim of cybercrime. Here are some of the best ideas for staying safe online:

1. Use Strong, Unique Passwords

- Create complex passwords that include a mix of uppercase and lowercase letters, numbers, and special characters. One trick is to pick three words such as dog, cat, fox, throw them together an add in a character or two to break it up or substitute some of the letters for numbers. Here's an example: *c4tD0g@F0x*.
- Avoid using the same password across multiple sites. If one site is compromised, all your accounts could be at risk.
- Use a password manager to generate and store strong, unique passwords for each of your accounts.

Report by Historical Secretary

Stephen Read (former WO1 (SMAC))



Back in "flaming?" June my wife, Penny, and I, and friends spent a week visiting north eastern France and north west Belgium. Our aim was both to explore these areas to find what they have to offer in the 2020s and to go back 110 years to the battle fields of WW1. Like many of us I have ancestors who fought in the Great War, some survived, others were not so lucky. They were all extremely brave young men.

At times it was an emotional trip, for example visiting the grave in Boulogne of a man who, were it not for his untimely death in 1914, I would not be here. We visited the major British sites, like the Menin Gate (covered in scaffolding so I didn't get to see a relative's name) and the massive Tyne Cott cemetery, along with some of the smaller Allied sites which seemed to pop at sad repetition ever couple of kilometres. Their row upon row of immaculate white marble headstones and name plagues were ore inspiring to see and immaculately maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Whilst very moving these were not, for me, however, the most impactful sites. The brass keys embedded in the pavements in Ypres; each one commemorating a named child or adult who, along

with 700 other civilians were killed in that utterly destroyed city. The medieval cloth hall and cathedral, the 700-year-old inn, all of which look their age but we're actually completely rebuilt in the inter war period. The original and very first TOCH (Talbot House) in Poperinge that was frequented by many young soldiers, who unlike us BAOR veterans, often did not make it home.

All of these added a different perspective to the usual picture of WW1. But, most surprisingly, the two things that had the greatest impact were, personally, both very close and very far from me. The closest was standing on Dunkerque beach looking down this miles long, wide, stretch of sand that in 1940 my 19 year old father crossed on his way to embark on one of the little boats back to England. The other, was visiting the German cemetery at Langemark that contains over 44 thousand dead including a mass grave, not much bigger that a tennis court, containing the remains of 20 thousand men. As explained in the small commemorative hall (packed floor to ceiling with thousands of names) many of the men that lye there were little more than boys. They were young students and their lecturers and professors, who formed reserve divisions thrown against the machine gun like rifle fire of highly trained, professional, British Guards and Scottish Infantry divisions.

We visited the excellent Passchendaele battlefield museum with its immersive virtual reality representation of the battlefield with its dual clock and casualty counter. There we met one of the many parties of British school children who visit the Battle fields as part of their GCSE History curriculum. The majority were not really interested, but who could blame them? They were being made to visit these sites from a past, that to them, is an "ancient" history that they have no connection with. How do we change this? I don't know but as a nation we ought to try as the men (and women) who gave their lives deserve to be remembered.

Putting life stories to the names is a start. The most memorable people for me were those names we could find on the Internet with their life histories. The young nurse, the first to die in WW1. The Austrian Count who fought for Britain as a Pilot in WW2 and came to grief in Northern frame in 1943. The 2 British Army Ptes who died in captivity in 1918 and who now lie in a mass German war grave.

So, I have 3 final thoughts:

- 1. Belgium trappist beer is excellent and the brewery and restaurant at Watou is well worth a visit.
- 2. If you have not already done so, visit the battlefields.
- 3. Before you are unable to write down your memories of service so that your families and future generations can learn from you lives and experiences. You don't need to be a professional author, just write down what ever thoughts you have and send them to me. I will help you with the word crafting. If you wish further details of how to start drop me an email.

the Battery Clerk of 170 (Imjin)
Field Battery, I really had found my

After 5 Airborne Brigade rerolled into 16 Air Assault Brigade and moved to Colchester and I completed my third tour in the Balkans, I was posted to Headquarters Allied Rapid Reaction Corps in Rheindahlen, again having a slice of Staff Clerking it was an excellent posting.

I enjoyed it so much, after after a posting at 5th Battalion REME in Catterick as the FSA and Regimental Accountant, I was promoted to WO2 and asked if I could return to HO ARRC. I knew they were about to deploy to become HQ ISAF in Kabul. My wish was granted, the downside was we arrived in Rheindahlen again and I 'hopped' onto a Galaxy and flew to Kabul, leaving Shell & James to unpack and settle in alone this time, nothing new here, something I think we have all experienced.

After the Kabul Tour, James was in his last 2 years of school at Windsor in JHQ, we asked to retain a quarter there as I would be approaching another posting. This was permitted when HQ ARRC was moving into Imjin Barracks, Innsworth, as I was the Support Battalions RAOWO and was appointed as the UK side liaison to get everything set up for both the Battalion and the HQ to

arrive, it was at this point I was awarded the MSM for my actions.

We were then posted to the NATO Communications Support Agency in Mons, located with SHAPE. James became a weekly border at JHQ, and we lived in Mons, which was converted into our chance to save up the deposit for our future home in the UK. I carried out another tour of Kabul at this stage, again administrating the civilians and soldiers of the agency who deployed to ensure the communications network in Afghanistan remained active and secure.

After NCSA, I was posted as the RAWO of the 10th Training Battalion REME in Borden as the RAWO and Imprest Holder, tag teaming the job with Paddy Butler, another amazing job having a contracted RAO department and a MOD Civil Servant as an RAO – I had never worked in that world before but again it was most rewarding. At this point I volunteered for a tour of Afghanistan, this time as the RAWO of the Overseas Mentoring

and Liaison Team – what a great tour that was, a real test. This would be my last operational tour and a high note to end on. During the tour I was personally introduced to Prince Harry as he attended the last remembrance service in Kandahar for UK forces, 30 years prior to this in 1984 on a Chindits parade I spoke to his father, the then Prince Charles – now that's a memory to hold on to.

The Chindits link would appear again on my next posting to the newly formed 77th Brigade at Denison Barracks, Hermitage when again they sponsored the Chindits association on a visit, I met a former Chindit who was on the same parade back in 1984!! 77th Brigade at the time based themselves on Wingate's units, operating in columns and conducting irregular operations in the grey area.

I finally ended my career at the newly formed 6th (United Kingdom) Division based at Trenchard Lines Upavon and was discharged in October 2021, not a bad innings really for someone who's natural 22 years' service should have ended in October 2005!

I now find myself working for the NHS in a role not dissimilar to my military ones, where I am responsible for the induction of new starters to the community nursing teams and I directly support two area nursing managers in their role. Our vocation of supporting others runs through me like a stick of rock, learnt in whole during those formative years in the Royal Regiment.

I am grateful for the opportunity to carry out the role of area secretary for the East of England now and would like to take this chance to wish you all well for Christmas 2024 and the New Year. I am very much looking forward to seeing you all in person online and I will make a most overdue physical appearance at our next reunion weekend.

Royal Artillery Association Working Group

I have recently taken over responsibility for Wessex and the South West Region of the RAA and, as a newly elected member of the RAA executive council will also champion the needs of the Arty Clerks Association.

I have been involved in three RAA Working Groups (WG) looking at the current model of RAA Branches and considering options for the future. One early conclusion the WG came to was that the old model, although still very strong in some areas, was certainly on the demise and not attractive to the majority of current

service leavers. Therefore, this review was deemed critical to help navigate a way ahead.

During the first session it was clarified that the RAA views the Artillery Clerks' Association as one of its National Branches, covering both national and international links to its members across the globe. The WG reviewed the Association's constitution and governance and concluded that they were fit for purpose.

Work is still ongoing with priority effort in outreach to be more

inclusive and receptive to the current veteran population. Formal branch regularity and propriety have been scrutinised to help them become more flexible and less formal. One of the major work streams is capturing all the disparate veteran groups that currently communicate very successfully via social media with reunions and catch-up meeting mainly being organised via "Facebook" or "WhatsApp". As all these groups are entitled to the welfare provisions of the Royal Artillery Charitable Fund, it follows that they should have closer links to RHO RA without the need to

become a formal branch with all the legacy regulations and rules.

Future meetings have yet to be decided but work is currently ongoing by RHQ RA in Establishing the governance and management process to bring the eclectic cyber space groups closer to the Regimental Hub without the intervention of a formal bureaucratic process.

34 (Seringapatam) Battery Royal Artillery 2Lt J Owen RA

As ever 34 (Seringapatam) Battery RA, The Tigers, continues to be incredibly busy fulfilling a uniquely diverse role within 14 Regt RA and the wider Royal Regiment, ably supported by a broad parish of highly skilled and motivated soldiers and officers that rotate in and out of the Battery for their 2-year posting. The forecast of events is as diverse as out people and filled up quickly this year, especially with a significant number of opportunities beyond the Battery's primary role of Live Firing on Salisbury Plain. Troops deployed in support of 2 R YORKS as part of the Experimentation and Trials Group, to both America and France, moreover the Battery is spearheading a two week deployment to Brecon on Ex COMBINED WARRIOR (CW) where nearly a dozen ITT and STT schools will exercise together in a combined arms exercise. This will be the first deployment of this kind for the Battery and 14 Regt RA in the memory of any currently serving within the organisation.

We'll start with the end of the year and work our way backwards, a winter deployment to Brecon is not the norm for a Battery that have become SME's at firing live on the Salisbury Plain Training Area but is a challenge the Tigers

welcome wholeheartedly. Ex CW will be the third iteration of the deployment for the Tigers but will be the most aspirational to date with some first-class training opportunities planned. The evolution of the exercise has seen the Battery deploy to provide a week of fire planning in support of the FST Commanders Course from the Royal School of Artillery. For the first time this was done as the FSTs embedded themselves within phase 2 and 3 IBS infantry companies. A genuine success and welcome change of pace the Exercise has now blossomed into a full scale all arms exercise with a focus on integrating Combined Arms Manoeuvre into the exercises for phase 2 officers and soldiers alike. To list but a few of the schools and units deploying you obviously have IBS that make Sennybridge their home, the YO's on their Close Support segment of the Gunners officer phase 2, phase 2 Gunner soldiers on the L118 strike, ACS close support and Arty Log courses, the Royal School of Military Engineering will be supporting with digging gun pits to be used during the Live Fire serials, the newly founded Royal Army Medical Services providing a full med chain for simulated exercise casualties, RMP to marshal Brigade moves

and REME to service any vehicles that might require it. As you can see it is a full scale exercise that will give all soldiers deploying and especially personnel still under training invaluable insight into how the Army will and must fight going forward to match the threats we are facing on the contemporary global stage.

Alongside preparing soldiers for the future of warfighting, the Regiment has said goodbye to an iconic piece of equipment the AS90, Monday 4th Nov saw the Regiment send off the last of the Royal Regiments AS90's after 32 years of service. The Regiment had the privilege of saluting the Colours as they departed Larkhill to take up their new role serving in the Ukrainian armed forces as part of the British Army's GiK (Gifting in Kind) programme in support of Ukrainian defence. A sombre occasion but one that opens the door to a focus on our newest Artillery system the Swedish designed Archer 155m Howitzer and how best to employ it before the Royal Regiment fully converts to the newly announced 155m RCH based on the Boxer platform.

On November 11th as part of the nations commemoration of the fallen, the Tigers had the



privilege of supporting 3 local Remembrance services as well as conducting the minute gun at the Larkhill Garrison church during the two minutes silence. A chance for the Battery and the wider local community to come together, reflect and remember the sacrifice made by those that came before us and the importance of remembrance. Photos included with the article show a contingent of the Battery present at the war memorial in Durrington (from right to left Lt Fraser, Bdr Gater, Sgt Gasan, Bdr Whittaker, Bdr Jollife).

The Battery has continued to provide opportunities for its



personnel outside of what would be considered normal duties for soldiers. Visits have been organised to the Defence Academy Shrivenham to study AFV design and production as well as a display on explosives and their utility in munitions. A favourite within the Battery was the trip to Plymouth, this gave the soldiers and officers that attended 2 days away from the gun park with events that included insight into the Citadel and the history of 29 Commando RA. The culmination of this visit was the Batteries attempt at HMS Havoc, the Navies sinking

ship simulation. This put the participants in a series of rooms quickly filling with water with limited time and tools to stop the 'ship' from sinking. He particularly emphasised that:

- **Subscriptions**. Subscription is set at £15 annually and should be paid on or close to 1 January. Outstanding subscriptions total £1,355.00 as of today. There are currently 14 unpaid subscriptions for 2024. As directed, I have issued a letter to members requesting payment of outstanding subscriptions.
- **Mandate**. All members are urged to pay by mandate. If all personnel paid subscriptions by the mandate system, then this would ease and simplify the administration burden. 9 members are yet to pay by this method.
- **Gift Aid.** This is an excellent source of income for the fund. £4,536.46 to date. Our take continues to be £3.75 for every £15 individuals contribute. For the Association to claim our Gift Aid then members must complete the declaration. I urge the 19 members to put pen to paper. The Association has now been granted charity status with effect 9th October 2020. It is estimated that a refund of approximately £450 per annum can be expected. In 2023 this was £1,094.13. The additional balance was due to advances made to the Silver Centre Piece Fund caused by members donating post the 2022 submission date.
- **Suspensions**. In accordance with the Association's policy on suspension, The Treasurer wrote to all members who have not paid their subscriptions for 3 years. There are currently 54 members shown as 'suspended'. There could be a further 1 for 2024.
- **Shop**. Shop stock consists of 15 ties @ £20:00, therefore totaling £300.00. There are no cuff links and lapel pins remaining.
- **Property**. Property is divided into 2 sections. Display Boards which total £600. Silver Centre Piece £9,980.00. These items are now accounted for within the Association's Property Book. These are shown as an asset in the amount as you can see at £600.00 and £9,980.00 respectfully. Annual depreciation is set at £200 for the display boards and there is no devaluation set against the Silver Centre Piece.
- **Insurance**. The insurance for the fund is valid until 31 Mar 25. It is with the firm Towergate Wilsons. The cost this year was £305.06. This includes personal accident cover for the Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Reunion Secretary, Standard Bearer and Regional Secretaries.
- 2023 Income and Expenditure Report (As of 31 Dec 23 submitted to the RAA) The End of the Year Report for 2023 was submitted to the RAA as directed, signed by the Chairman and Secretary. More details are available on request if required but the end state was:

- **Support to the RAA**. The Association, via the Secretary continues to support the RAA when called upon to do so.
- **Conclusion**. With available cash totaling £6,447.51 (less property) the fund is healthy and strong, which sets us up well for the coming year and beyond. I urge all members to check to ensure their subscription is £15.00 and if not, to contact their banks to amend this prior to 2025. I thank all members for their continued support to the fund and to me in my role as Treasurer.

David Cussell proposed, and Richard Horner seconded, that the `Treasurer's Report is accepted. This proposal was put to the vote and CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

The Chairman thanked the Association Treasurer for his custodianship of the Association's funds and especially for his ability to extract the Gift Aid Refund from HMRC.

SSAFA's services are only available to people who have received at least one day's pay from the Armed Forces (British Army, Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, Royal Marines, including Reserves) or are in the immediate family of someone who served.

The Chairman thanked everyone for your continued support, understanding and cooperation as we adapt to this change, as well as for your enthusiasm for The Crossed Quills. We look forward to sharing many more engaging editions with you in the future.

16. Agenda Item 16 - Any other Business

16.1 RAA Working Group update. Lt Col Richard Horner informed the AGM that he has been involved in three RAA Working Groups (WG) looking at the current model of RAA Branches and considering options for the future. One early conclusion the WG came to was that the old model, although still very strong in some areas, was certainly on the demise and not attractive to the majority of current service leavers. Therefore, this review was deemed critical to help navigate a way ahead.

During the first session it was clarified that the RAA views the Artillery Clerks' Association as one of its National Branches, covering both national and international links to its members across the globe. The WG reviewed the Association's constitution and governance and concluded that they were fit for purpose.

Work is still ongoing with priority effort in outreach to be more inclusive and receptive to the current veteran population. Formal branch regularity and propriety have been scrutinised to help them become more flexible and less formal. One of the major work streams is capturing all the disparate veteran groups that currently communicate very successfully via social media with reunions and catch-up meeting mainly being organised via "Facebook" or "WhatsApp". As all these groups are entitled to the welfare provisions of the Royal Artillery Charitable Fund, it follows that they should have closer links to RHQ RA without the need to become a formal branch with all the legacy regulations and rules.

Future meetings have yet to be decided but work is currently ongoing by RHQ RA in establishing the governance and management process to bring the eclectic cyber space groups closer to the Regimental Hub without the intervention of a formal bureaucratic process.

17. Agenda Item 17 - Date of Next Meeting

The next Virtual AGM will take place at 1900 hours on Tuesday 20th May 2025.

18. Toasts. At the end of the AGM, the Chairman led the loyal toast to His Majesty The King, our Captain General, followed by toasts to the Association and to absent friends.

The Association Chair proposes the following motion:

Title: Change to the prescribed conditions for Honorary Membership of the Association.

- 1. **Proposed Amendment**: That the prescribed conditions for Honorary Membership of the Association are changed to include relatives of Full members of the Association, as well as widows and relatives of deceased Full members of the Association. It proposed that the Charter of the Artillery Clerks' Association is amended by including a new sub paragraph 8 b, as shown in bold below:
 - 8. **Honorary Membership**. The prescribed conditions for Honorary membership of the Association are:
 - a. Widow or relative of deceased Full member of the Association.
 - b. Relative of an incumbent Full member of the Association.
 - b. Incumbent and former Honorary Presidents of the Association.
 - c. Former clerks who served in the Royal Artillery in the rank of Bombardier with distinction and worthy of consideration.
- **2. Reason for inclusion**: Our Association is an agile, caring and responsive. The proposed amendment, if passed, reinforces the aim of the Association Committee to continue to explore ways to increase the Full and Honorary Membership base of the Association. The Proposer feels that the prospect to maximise wider recruitment opportunities ensures that the Association is not missing out on the value and benefits of broader membership, opening a way to fresh ideas and new friendships.
- **3. Effect if passed**: In pursuance of paragraph 8 of the Association Charter, the Association Committee will remain vested with the authority to confer Honorary Membership of the Association to any nominated person who, in its opinion, is likely to deliver beneficial service to the Association. Successful nominations will then be submitted with due notice for ratification by a majority vote by those members present and entitled to vote at an AGM or EGM.
- **4. Main argument**: Increasing the Association membership base has been a persistent challenge over the past several years. We need to embrace all opportunities to increase Full and Honorary membership to ensure the vitality and sustainability of our Association. Restrictive clauses in our Charter should not hinder our ability to welcome new members. This change would allow us to recognise and welcome individuals who may not meet the traditional criteria but nonetheless have strong ties to our Association their familial connections and are nominated by trusted and long serving Full Members.

The Historical Secretary proposes the following motion:

Title: Creation and population of an **Archive of members reminiscences** of serving as Artillery Clerks.

- **1. Proposal**: That the Association create an archive of members reminiscences of serving as Artillery Clerks to which all Association members are invited to contribute.
- **2. Reason for inclusion**: When we are gone how do we help others understand what it was like serving as an Artillery Clerk? Having recently worked on the reminiscences of 2 former Artillery Clerks I was struck by how different their worlds were to the one we live in now and how their experiences of being an Artillery Clerk was both familiar yet different. Having marked the 25th Anniversary of the Association with a physical memorial, the Crossed Quills, the Committee wish to initiate a project to record the intangible; the experiences of members before we fade away into history. This will allow current and future generations to learn something about us and the service we gave.
- **3. Effect if passed**: The Association would create an archive of reminiscences to which members would be encouraged to contribute.
- **4. Main argument**: When we are gone how do we help others understand what it was like serving as an Artillery Clerk? Having recently worked on the reminiscences of 2 former Artillery Clerks, one who served during WW2 and the other during the 1950s and 60s, I was struck by how different their worlds were to the one we live today and how their experiences were, on one hand, so familiar and yet on the other so different. Having now completed 25 years as an Association, and having marked the event with a physical memorial, the silver Crossed Quills, the Association wish to start a project to record members experiences. This will allow current and future generations to learn something about us and the service we gave.
- 5. Before members say: "Why would people want to hear about my story?" Think about the places you served (Germany, Hong Kong, Cyprus, Singapore, Aden, Iraq, Bosnia, NI etc), the units you served with (the majority now gone), the service and support you gave (In today's Army officers do their own typing and filing, and soldiers complete much of their administration on-line, not by interacting with an experienced and knowledgeable clerk). By recording your experiences, you will help people understand that life and service were once very different (and in many ways better?).
- 6. You do not need to be a skilled writer or budding author to record your memories. Write them down or type them up as best you can, or even record them. You do not need to produce everything at one go, write things up in whatever sections work best for you. Send the results to me and I will help put them into a form that we can publish in an accessible archive.
- 7. When writing up your memories members are encouraged to think about:

When did I join up?

Where did I do my training and what was it like?

Why did I decide to be an Artillery Clerk?

What people did I service with and what were they like, who were the characters?

Where did I serve, with what units, in what countries and what was it like?

What were the best things and the not so good things, about living in another country?

When I went on exercise or on operations what was it like, including your thoughts on being in a war situation?

What was my social life like; in the Bombardiers' or Sergeants' Messes, in town, on the patch, did you make good friends, even meet your future spouse?

Did I play sport, what sport and did I enjoy it?

What were the highlights of my career and what, if appropriate, do I wish I had done differently? Have I got any photos that I can include to illustrate my story?

In short anything, irrespective of how trivial it may feel to you, that casts light upon your experiences.

Long Service & Good Conduct Award (Part 2)

When I passed through the gates of Gamecock Barracks, Bramcote in June 1976, I had little idea what to expect and I didn't have a clue what the future lay ahead for me in the Royal Regiment of Artillery. I certainly did not realise that I would spend the next 23 years 253 days in the British Army achieve the rank of Warrant Officer Class 2 and see service throughout the world including operational tours in Northern Ireland.

years later when I had changed roles to become a clerk I was able to access my conduct sheets and found out that the award was illegal as the BC could only award punishment up to 7 days, needless to say no one told me and I carried out all 14 days of the punishment.

Unfortunately for me an incident in 1978 would see me incur a Regimental entry and end up in front of the Commanding Officer object I was bleeding profusely and not feeling too good, I was taken by ambulance to the local German hospital where it was identified that I had sustained a fractured skull and had three deep lacerations to my scalp. After a few days in the hospital, and 32 stiches in the wounds I was transferred to BMH Munster to convalesce, two weeks later I was later discharged from hospital and returned to the Regiment.

The other soldier involved in the incident was due to be discharged and leave the Army in short time and he was charged with Assault Occasioning Actual Bodily Harm and fined three weeks wages. He left the army and I put the matter behind me and moved on with my service career. The Commanding Officer of 7 RHA at the time was Lt Col Giles Arnold RHA some months later I would be in front of him again however, this time it was to receive an award in the Inter-Battery Boxing Finals.

During my time in the Army the Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (Regular Army) was only available to other ranks, the qualifying period for the award was to have served for 16 years (from 18th birthday or date of enlistment) and have a good conduct (no entries on your Regimental conduct sheets). My first ever Regimental Chief Clerk at 7th Regiment RHA in Roberts Barracks, Osnabruck was Colin Turner. I am sure he would look at the likes of Gunner Morgan and other young wet behind the ears junior clerks and wonder if we were even old enough to be serving. It must be said it was nothing uncommon to find oneself tapping the boards in front of the Battery Commanders desk for various minor misdemeanours. I received 14 days Restriction of Privileges for Bouncing a cheque at the pay office for £20, some

being fined two weeks wages for fighting with another soldier. To be fair when I look back, I feel a little aggrieved, I acknowledged my guilt and accepted the CO's award rather than elect to go for trial by Court Martial. To be fair I had given the other lad a broken nose and two black eyes but had gone to my bed with the intention of resolving whatever the issue that had caused, or disagreement and subsequent fist fight the next morning. Unfortunately, the other lad clearly had other ideas and as I lay asleep in my bed, he decided to seek retribution and assaulted me with a piece of shelving metal. Fortunately for me, I woke and was able to force him out of my room before one of the JNCO's who lived in the adjourning single room came to see what all the noise and commotion was about. As you would imagine having been assaulted with a heavy metal

It was not until 1993 when I reached the period of eligibility for consideration for the Long Service and Good Conduct award that the entry on my Regimental Conduct sheet and blemish on my otherwise exemplary record of service resurfaced. I was by then a Staff Sergeant (Artillery Clerk) and the Regimental Chief Clerk of 3rd Regiment Royal Horse Artillery and enjoying my time with the Regiment stationed in Colchester, Northern Ireland and Topcliffe. In October 1992 the Regiment deployed at short notice to Northern Ireland as the Drummard Roulment Battalion in South Armagh. The Commanding Officer at the time was Lord David Richards and I was extremely humbled to receive the award of a General Officer Commanding Northern Ireland's Commendation on completion of the 6-month deployment. During the operational deployment I was not only carrying out my normal duties as the Chief Clerk but was also the Commanding Officer's Patrol Group Commander and was

often deployed independently on the ground with clerical staff from RHQ making up the foot patrol, occasionally I even deployed in command of multiple teams made up of Ulster Defence Regiment soldiers and other personnel from 3 RHA. I was immensely proud to receive the GOC's commendation along with 4 other SNCO's in the Warrant Officers and Sergeant's Mess at Alanbrooke Barracks in Topcliffe, having returned to Colchester on completion of the deployment the Regiment was informed that it was to Arms Plot Move to North Yorkshire and swap locations with 19 Regiment Royal Artillery.

Although I submitted a plea in mitigation in support of my application for the Long Service & Good Conduct Medal it was sadly rejected, Lord Richards however, reassured me that he was determined that I should receive the award and on the back of a strongly worded application by him and a lot of hard work by the Adjutant (General Richard Nugee) a further plea in mitigation and application was submitted and I was awarded the Long Service and Good Conduct Medal (Regular Army) in 1994.

Having been transferred into the Adjutant General's Corps (Staff and Personnel Support) in 1993 and promoted to the acting rank of Warrant Officer when I was presented the award by General Sir Mike Jackson

(late Parachute Regiment) and at the time GOC 3 (UK) Division, whilst presenting me my medal Gen Jackson commented on my parachute wings and enquired when I had passed P Company and did I have aspirations to return to Airborne Forces. It may have been purely coincidental but Gen Jackson had previously Commanded 1st Battalion The Parachute Regiment but I was a little surprised that when I was posted from 3rd Regiment RHA in 1995, I found myself being posted as the Regimental Administration Officer Warrant Officer (RAOWO) to 1 PARA I met General Jackson later whilst attending as a guest at a function for the opening of the new Normandy Barracks Mess in Aldershot, we spoke briefly, and he smiled as he said I'm sure you'll have an extremely enjoyable time with the Battalion (now that's a story for another time).

Having completed my 22-year engagement I retired and was discharged from the Army on 10 February 2000, having returned to Topcliffe for the final three years of my military service career. Having returned to North Yorkshire with my wife and family where we had a great time and many happy memories. Indeed we felt so settled that is where we live to this day along with our three daughters and six grandchildren. My resettlement was planned and based around me joining the Police with the intention of being a Police Constable and all was moving in the right direction having passed the initial assessment and fitness tests to join Cleveland Police only to be turned down on medical grounds that I had or may have incurred injuries that may affect me later in my Police service, the doctor at Topcliffe was the local GP and he had discovered x-ray's in my medical docs from back in 1984 which indicated that there was potentially an issue with my neck

(sports injury (rugby) and military parachuting).

I was bitterly disappointed and revaluated my options but was successful in securing employment with the local Hambleton District Council as a Verification Visiting Officer moving to live in Northallerton in May 2000. I supplemented my income working as a Doorman at a local night club on weekends. I spent a large part of the first few years after leaving the army trying to re-enlist or join the Reserve, I even had a former Artillery Clerk as a member of the interview panel when I interviewed for the FRTS RAOWO post with 4 PARA in Pudsey, Leeds. Sadly, I didn't get the post and in June 2003 I successfully in obtaining a position with North Yorkshire Police working as a Data Input Controller in the Police National Computer Bureau at Northallerton Police Station. In 2005 I moved to work in a uniformed position as an Operational Support Officer in the Enquiry Office at Northallerton Police Station providing support and assistance to operational police officers in a variety of roles. I still however, harboured a desire to be a Police officer and applied to be a Police Community Support Officer and in 2007 and completed the selection for the role. unfortunately, as the role was still relatively new there were limited vacancies and I moved instead to work in the Custody Suite as a Detention Officer. I thoroughly enjoyed this position which must be considered as part of the frontline policing as you were most definitely up close and personal with the under belly of society and those criminals who have literally no respect whatsoever for the rule of law and order. I was assaulted on a numerous occasion's but became very adept at realising when something or someone was about to kick off or utilising a pre-emptive strike to

prevent being assaulted. During the 10 years I spent as I Detention Officer I dealt with everything from murderers, rapists, drug dealers, thieves, and criminals of every persuasion. We had the Chief Constable and Deputy Chief Constable from a neighbouring Force arrested and detained in our cells whilst under investigation for corruption, interestingly there were no other prisoners in the cells the two days they were in custody, and they did not have to eat the meals provided by custody staff. My claim to fame is a fingerprinted and photographed ex-England football international Paul Gazza Gascoyne when he was detained on suspicion of driving over the prescribed limit. Unfortunately, due to a restructuring of the custody suites within North Yorkshire Police the custody cells at Northallerton closed and indeed the police station was sold off and is now a boutique hotel, bar & restaurant and the new Police station is now housed within the new joint Police and Fire & Rescue Service Headquarters in Northallerton. Initially at risk of redundancy I moved to the Force Intelligence Bureau as an Intelligence Research Officer where I am heavily involved in North Yorkshire Police Warrants, Wanted and Missing Persons, Prison Recalls and I am also the Force Single Point of Contact for all enquiries with the National Disclosure Unit for the Department

In June 2023 I completed twenty years' service with North Yorkshire Police and on Monday 31st July 2023 I was invited to attend a Long Service and Good Conduct Ceremony held at Police Headquarters, which also included some Police Officer Promotions, the awards were made by the Chief Constable Lisa Winward QPM and the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of North Yorkshire Brigadier David Maddan, also present was the

for Work and Pensions.

Police, Fire & Crime Commissioner for North Yorkshire Zoe Metcalfe, Assistant Chief Constable Elliot Foskett. All recipients received a Certificate of Service, a Long Service & Good Conduct Medal including for the first time Police Staff as well as Police Officers to recognise the effort and contribution made by all staff and personnel within North Yorkshire Police.

I have had some extremely challenging times during my service with North Yorkshire Police and it has not always been easy job, and that is not just dealing with the criminals, so it was nice to hear my citation being read out on the evening of the awards ceremony and to then to receive my award which I am extremely proud to have received.

Living the Dream - My Post-Army Life in France

When I was asked to write something for Crossed Quills I was at first a little hesitant; would anybody be that interested in what I've been up to since I retired? Well, I'm about to find out!

I suppose the story begins back in 2005 when Caroline and I first got the keys to our home here in Lennon, a picturesque little village in Brittany. We had bought a large 4-bedroom detached house in need of some attention and over the next 12 years we pretty much spent all our leave (and a lot of our money) renovating. Most of what was required was cosmetic, although the village had just gone onto a mains sewerage system, so we took the opportunity to engage a builder to connect us and install new bathrooms; since then, we've pretty much redecorated the entire house, including converting the attic into a master suite with changing room and ensuite bathroom and creating a Gite from an old stable attached to the house. The only room still to receive the full makeover treatment is the kitchen, mainly due to artistic differences – we still can't decide/agree on the type of kitchen to install.

My retirement from the Army in late 2017 coincided with Caroline deciding to use an inheritance to purchase a "project" property on the outskirts of our village; a four-bedroom farmhouse with a large L shaped barn complex (the barn being split into 3 distinct areas) and just over half an acre of land. The plan being to modernise the farmhouse and convert the barns into two two-bedroom properties, giving us 3 Gites, and a classroom with communal facilities from the third area of the barns. 2018

saw little in the way of progress, it was all about getting planning permission from our local Marie and getting a builder booked in to replace the roof across the entire barn building; I intended to do as much of the overall build as I could myself, but replacing the entire roof structure was definitely more than I could cope with alone. We saw the barn roof as a priority, as a large section of it was quite rotten and in danger of collapse if left unattended. The rest of 2018 saw me working on the main house, finishing the Gite and tanking the cellar (which is now a smart little cellar bar known as 'The Mess').

Work on the roof started in earnest in May 2019. Whilst I was a fairly competent DIYer and decorator, I was initially classed as a builder's labourer, mainly responsible for lifting and carrying. We were blessed with fine weather that spring and summer and were able to remove the old decaying slate and strip out the rotten timbers in fairly quick order. We then had to stabilise the top of the stone walls with a concrete pad, rebuilding a gable end and replacing a door lintel in the process. We then rebuilt the entire roof and re-slated, by this stage I was allowed to participate in actual skilled work (albeit supervised!). Part of the barn build included the construction of a timber frame extension at the rear of the buildings to create a kitchen and toilet for the classroom area and, most importantly, a workshop and garden store for me. This stage of the work commenced in September after a much-needed break for holidays. Unfortunately, it was a rather wet autumn, so not nearly as much fun as the roof build.

With the integrity of the barns sorted out, I then turned my attention to the farmhouse, using my newly acquired skills I began to strip out the 1960s electrics and plumbing. This was a slow process, I quickly realized that when working alone it takes much longer to get anything done.

Throughout the period from my retirement in October 2017 through until March 2020 Caroline was still serving in the Army, so I was making regular trips to see her, initially to UK then to Germany. She joined me full time in March 2020, just as the world shut down due to COVID 19. With both of us now living full time in France we started the process of applying for Residency, a process made easier for us as we were both earning a little money and paying our taxes in France – me through our little Gite at the main house (available to view on AirBnB - "Lennon Cottage with Countryside Views!)) and Caroline as an English teacher at a language school in Brest.

COVID 19 probably set me back a year in terms of the renovation of the farmhouse, Caroline arriving and giving me a hundred other tasks has probably added another two! I'm rarely idle, with two large gardens to keep on top of, the continuing farmhouse renovations and all the little jobs that come my way via Caroline, life is pretty full. That isn't to say we don't find time to enjoy our local environment. Finistère (our region of Brittany) is truly beautiful, we sit just on the edge of the Armorique National Park, are only half an hour from the Brittany coast which has miles of picturesque beaches to explore. Our garden is south facing with

views of the Black Mountains and is a pretty good place to enjoy a small glass of red.

If I'm asked how I'm enjoying life after the Army, I can honestly say I've never been happier. I'm as busy as I want to be and wine rack is never empty.







The Accidental Artillery Clerk

As I have continued to read the AC Crossed Quills Newsletter over the years, the stories of how individuals came to be an Artillery Clerk have always been of interest. People who know me are aware of my split career, the "cuckoo in the nest" at Reunion Dinners having spent a mere 14 years as a Gunner followed by the same as an officer in the RAMC. All well in the rear-view mirror now having retired from the Army early in 2002 to take my chances with a civilian career. But as I inhabit the world of an artificial knee, greying hair and forgetfulness, looking back it was all great fun. However, my Gunner career was an accident and my AC days started not as a volunteer, but press-ganged and it is long past time to dig into those memory banks and blame the guilty.....

The Army was not on my 17 ½ year old apprentice's radar until one day I saw a military aircraft disgorge a bunch of paratroopers onto a local training area. Within the space of a couple of months I had taken the shilling (Southend

on Sea) and in December 1972 found myself in Sutton Coldfield. Although courtesy of my father we had spent a lot of time abroad, I had never been north of London and the variety of accents and backgrounds was quite something. Freshly shorn. naïve but full of mustard it was time to meet the recruiters and although determined to be a paratrooper, I was convinced by an RA Major that it would be much more fun to be a Gunner where I could parachute, be a commando and do all sorts of mystical things with large items of fire breathing machinery. For some reason I cannot recall, at that time volunteers for parachute/ commando units were sent first to "normal" units to then be asked after 12 months if they still wanted to volunteer. After getting through basic training at Woolwich, in a bitingly cold Spring of 1973 I joined 42 Heavy Regiment in snow-covered Fallingbostel, equipped with the M107. As a newbie gun number, carrying shells and manning the gun

platform in all weathers life was... shall we say interesting.. which explains why when it came time to be asked if I was still a Commando volunteer, the answer was a most definite ves. Apart from NI tours, Site Guard and weeks in the field I had not achieved much apart from finding I was good at orienteering and attending a B3 clerks course in the UK to avoid another particularly cold month on the deck of an M107..... so in Spring 1974, with one other volunteer it was off to Plymouth. Did I mention I had also never been West of Salisbury?

To my surprise an exotically bearded, well-tanned man wearing a green beret in No 6 dress (by the name of Dave Scott (RIP)) met me at the train station and off to the Royal Citadel we went. I was living in a castle!!! The Commando Course beat-up was very aptly named and quite something, the training team were all determined to weed out the weeds and most individuals on my first course fell by the wayside. I hung in

but 2 weeks before completion I picked up an injury and did not move on to the Lympestone Royal Marines phase so for a few weeks of recovery time was at a loose end and here dark forces in the shape of the Cussells, father and son came into play! A certain Dave saw the B3 clerks course pass on my records and referred me to a certain Jim, the Chief Clerk (RIP). I was summoned to the Chief and the conversation went something like this "Do you want to be a Commando?" "Yes Sir" "You are a B3 trained clerk" "Yes Sir" "Do you want to work as a clerk in 29 Commando?" "No sir, I want to be on the front line". Jim, who had a lovely manner when helping people see the light changed tack slightly "Do you want to be a Commando?" "Yes Sir" "You are a B3 trained clerk" "Yes Sir" "Do you want to work as a clerk in 29 Commando or return to unit?" Well, I may not be the sharpest chisel in the toolbox but even I saw the writing on the wall and, with as much enthusiasm as I could muster, replied "I want to be a clerk in 29 Commando Sir". Smiles all round and off to report to said son of the Chief I went.... To be frank, I have not one single regret about the course my life then took – no grudges Dave! Serving in RHQ, HQ, 7 and 79 Batteries I had a fun time grappling with the Gestetner and four-fingered typing. I saw many parts of the world, did a huge amount of sport, gained para wings, learned to ski and qualified as a military ski instructor, survived in snow holes, trenches and "camped" in more forests than I could name. And being alongside Jim and Dave as well as various BSMs, BCs, Battery Clerks, Chief Clerks, Adjutants et al I learned so much about the workings of the Army in a short space of time. George Martin was a huge positive influence, on one occasion following some youthful high jinks (!) saving me from

the desire of the then Adjutant to have the Army dispense with my services...another, longer, story. I was fortunate enough to be promoted to Sqt AC in June 1980. As luck would have it, that signalled the end of my time with 29 Commando and despite my protestations and attempts to do a deal involving a swap, I was posted to 1 RHA. I was bitterly disappointed, enjoying life to the full with 29, knew nothing about horses and they were stationed in Yorkshire with a move to Germany on the cards. How I moaned to anyone that would listen about being totally unsuited to the RHA as I had never ridden a horse and because I was having such a nice time, the total injustice of sending me there...... Oh, the naivety and arrogance of youth. Once I had been firmly put back in my box, Topcliffe beckoned, and I went determined to prove myself. As luck would have it, opportunity to shine came when I was made the Movements Sergeant responsible for 1 RHAs move to Hohne. I had a final wobble just before this move when the Falklands conflict arose, going so far as to be told to stop driving to RAMRO to pester the manning officers as it would make no difference, I was staying with 1 RHA...

Regimental move successfully completed, I started to get over myself as we all do and buckled down to some serious work... interspersed with lots of sport naturally. Here again I learnt a huge amount from watching COs such as Mike Willcocks, Tim Granville-Chapman and from working closely with a whole series of supportive Adjutants - Andrew Ritchie, Chris Down, Danny Skillman, Mark Williams to name a few. After 4 years of strong recommendations for a commission, I formally applied in 1985. Finding myself, SSgt(AC), at the end of a long line of RSMs going in to see the MGRA (no

names, no pack drill but it began with an L...), I quick-timed in to be metaphorically patted on the head and told well done Brown, see you back here in 10 years ready to be a Quartermaster. Those who know the rest of the story will be giggling already.... Suffice it to say that my retort to MGRAs face that my 29-year-old self wasn't interested in waiting 10 years to be a QM (no disrespect), my Divisional Commander said I was ready now so why the wait went down like the proverbial in the bathwater. Quick-marching out somewhat faster than on entry, accompanied by a stern faced ADC, I went back to Hohne. The ADC, an RHA officer who I already knew and liked a lot, followed up and thanked me for the performance which had apparently been the source of considerable merriment amongst the HQ staff and added that a telephone call had taken place which meant that I had no hope whatsoever of a commission in the Gunners, full stop. Lady Luck again smiled on me when an orienteering friend, RAMC, laughed at the story with me and said why not try the RAMC. My "But I'm not a Doctor" led to a full briefing on the roles of administrative officers in the RAMC, at which point I retrieved my paperwork, added MC to RA and re-submitted it all. 8 months later I was discharged from the Royal Artillery to a commission in the RAMC, managing to reach the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, selected for Colonel AMS Blue List 2002, at which point aged 46 and working in MOD I decided enough was enough. Summing up, rose-tinted glasses firmly to one side, my Gunner career was a very enjoyable part of my life and I am in no doubt whatsoever that my AC training and experience was the basis for my relatively successful trajectory. UBIQUE.

Reminiscences of being an Artillery Clerk

When we are gone how do we help others understand what it was like serving as an Artillery Clerk? I have recently had the pleasure of working on the reminiscences of 2 former Artillery Clerks, one who served during the Second World War, and the other during the 1950s and 60s. What struck me about their stories was how different their worlds were to the one we live in now and how their experiences of being an Artillery Clerk were, on one hand, so familiar and yet on the other so different. Having now completed 25 years as an Association, and having marked this event with a physical memorial, the silver Crossed Quills, the Association would now like to start a project to record the experiences of our members. This will allow current and future generations to learn something about us and the service we gave.

Before members say: Why would people want to hear about my story? Think about the places your served (Germany, Hong Kong, Cypris, Aden, Iraq, Bosnia, NI etc), the units you served with (the majority now gone), the service and support you gave (In the Army of today all officers do their own typing and filing, and our soldiers complete much of their administration on-line, not by interacting with an experienced and knowledgeable clerk). By recording your experiences, you will help people understand that life and service were once very different (and in many ways better?)

You do not need to be a skilled writer or budding author to record your memories. Write them down on paper or type them up as best

you can, or even record them. You do not need to produce everything at one go, write things up in whatever sections work best for you. Send the results to me and I will help put them into a form that we can publish in the Artillery Clerks History Google Docs and on our website so people can read and understand them.

When writing up your memories think about the following:

When did you join up?

Where did you do your training and what was it like?

Why did you decide to be an Artillery Clerk?

What people did you service with and what were they like, who were the characters?

Where did you serve, with what units, in what countries and what was it like?

What were the best things and the not so good things, about living in another country?

When you went on exercise or on operations what was it like, including your thoughts on being in a war situation?

What was your social life like; in the Bombardiers' or Sergeants' Messes, in town, on the patch, did you make good friends, even meet your future spouse?

Did you play sport, what sport and did you enjoy it?

What were the highlights of your career and what, if appropriate, do you wish you had done differently.

Have you got any photos that you can include to illustrate your story?

In short anything, irrespective of how trivial it may feel to you, that casts a light upon your experiences.

Our Chairman, Joe, has stepped forward and volunteered to write down his reminiscences, so to build on his example, I encourage you all to have a go and record your experiences of being a Clerk in the Royal Regiment.

The primary purpose of the visit was to provide Mr Steve Carrivick, President of the Salisbury Circle of the Catenian Association, (the Circle members are one of the project's major donors) with a firsthand view of the scale and significance of the restoration effort. Supporting Homeless, Marginalised and Socially Excluded Veterans



Dear Friends,

In a world that often rushes past and forgets the sacrifices made by our veterans, it is crucial to pause and reflect on their stories and experiences. Many men and women who once wore the uniform now face homelessness and marginalisation, struggling to find their footing in modern society.



Since 1991, Alabaré, a UK based Christian care and support charity, has been dedicated to empowering homeless, vulnerable and excluded veterans to lead fulfilled and independent lives.

Eighteen months ago, I had the privilege of being approached by Andrew Lord MBE, CEO of *Alabaré*, to draw on my 37 years of service in the British Armed Forces and over 21 years with the Royal British Legion as a member, employee, trustee, and national officer. I was invited to develop a meaningful initiative focused on restoration and conservation at a military site of historical significance in Malta, aimed at uplifting the morale and well-being of ten veterans.

Thanks to the invaluable support of my colleagues in *The Catentian Association Circles in Malta*, my vision was presented to Heritage Malta, custodians and guardians of 8000 years of history, who embraced our project, and identified Fort Delimara as the ideal location. We have held several meetings, both online and in-person, to build up and refine the logistical details for the project scheduled to take place from 3^{rd} – 10^{th} May 2025.

Our Objectives

- 1. **Support Meaningful Development:** Enrich the lives of Alabaré's veteran beneficiaries through a hands-on project that fosters a collaborative environment, enhancing mental health, resilience, confidence and self-esteem, while combating loneliness and isolation.
- 2. **Contribute to Conservation:** Actively support the restoration and conservation efforts led by Heritage Malta, ensuring that our project leaves a lasting legacy in a historic country cherished by *Alabaré*'s donors, supporters and beneficiaries.
- 3. **Establish Community Links:** Create and strengthen enduring connections between *Alabaré* and the Maltese community, raising public awareness and inspiring future collaborative initiatives for the benefit of both communities.

We are particularly proud and privileged to have the support and patronage of the Commander of The Armed Forces of Malta for this project.







Fort Delimara was built between 1876 and 1884 by the British as part of a network of forts and batteries that protected Marsaxlokk Harbour. The end of World War II brought all existent fortifications in Malta into question. In 1956 the fort was stripped of most of its artillery and suffered decline, abandonment, neglect and misuse.

Ownership of Fort Delimara was transferred to Heritage Malta in August 2005. The fort still retains four of its original complement of six Victorian 12.5-inch 38-ton rifled muzzle-loading guns, mounted on their original small port carriages and platforms. Today, Fort Delimara stands as a testament to Malta's colonial past and British military history.

Throughout my time with the Royal British Legion, and now with *Alabaré*, I have witnessed firsthand the eight most pressing issues facing vulnerable veterans: These are:

A sense of belonging
A purposeful life
A strong connection

A supportive community

A listening ear.

A path to healing
A second chance

A safe environment

At *Alabaré*, we believe that these eight vulnerable veterans deserve hope and the chance for a more fulfilling life. While we may not be able to solve all their challenges, we excel at providing compassionate support and practical assistance. Together, with your financial support, we can make a meaningful difference in these eight lives.


